# Rams silent in defeat

## Woodlands 'stinks' in York cage tourney

There was an eerie silence outside the Woodlands Rams dressing room after a 43-39 loss to Lester B. Pearson Bengals Sunday in the semi-finals of the York University Basketball Tournament.

None of the usual sounds of a high school dressing room were there — no music, no shouting and especially, no laughter.

Coach Peter Kahro had shut the door, no one left and no one was let in. The Rams, one of the most explosive teams in Peel, had just played their worst game offensively.

High scoring forwards such as Eugene Gibson (11 points), Terry Bertrand (seven) and Greg St. Kitts got nothing off the boards. Guards Richard Hasfal (seven) and Jeff Kavanaugh (eight) were giving the Bengals nothing to worry about from the outside. It was time for Kahro to explode.

When Kahro finally emerged from the dressing room, no one had been executed for their poor performance and no one was hanging from the ceiling. Instead, Kahro chalked the lack of attack up to his team's recent inactivity.

"Today, it was an incredibly (bleep) offence. It just stunk," he said. "Of course, we haven't played a game since the 15th when we played the grads."

The Bengals are one of the top-ranked teams in Toronto but Kahro refused to use that as an excuse. He feels his team is as good and is looking forward to playing them again in The Times Classic Jan. 29-31.

Pearson used a collapsed zone defence to force Woodlands to shoot from farther out. The Bengals put three men, including star 6-foot-7 centre Roger Rollocks, under their basket to clog up the inside. The move worked according to Gibson.

"I think we were just afraid to shoot. We just wouldn't put the shots up," he said. "I think Rollocks intimidated us."

But while Rollocks held the Rams off defensively, Woodlands returned the favor by holding the high scoring centre to 13 points.

Kahro started the game by using Gibson as a shadow and switched to a zone coverage in the second quarter.

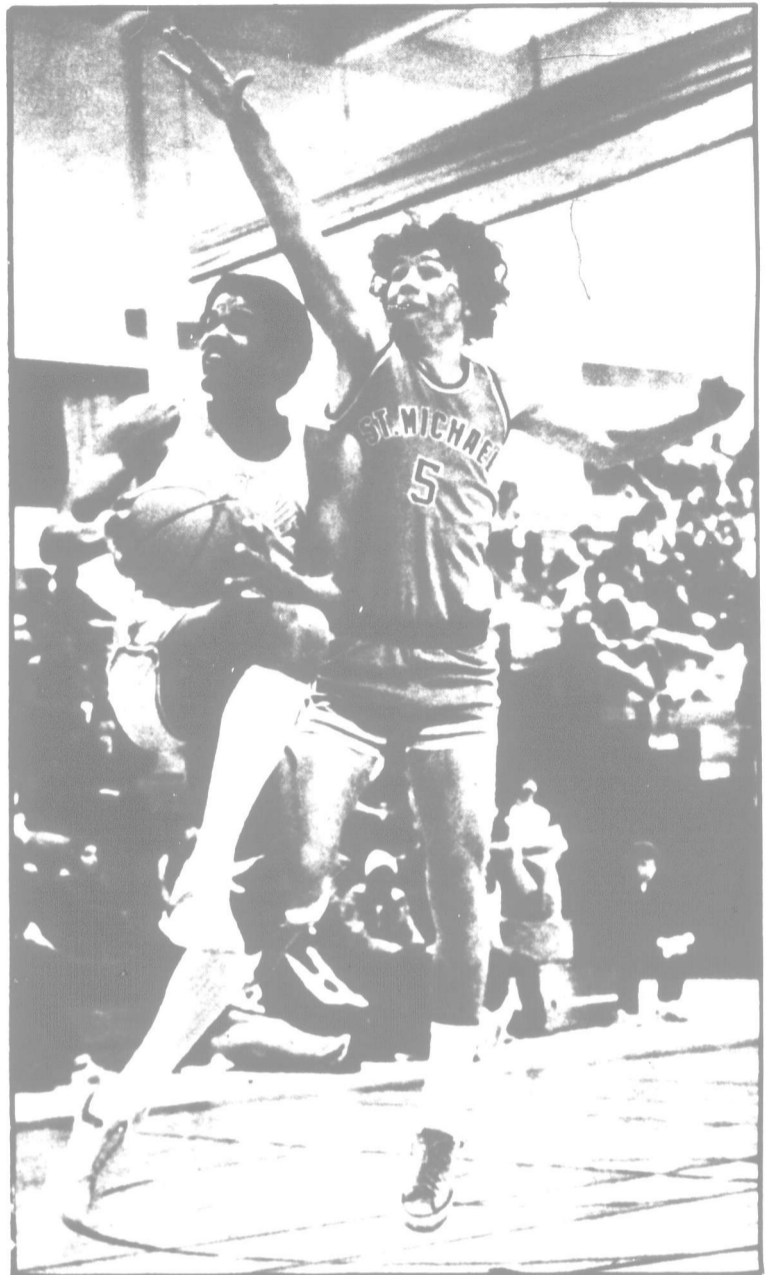
"Eugene did well against Rollocks," said Kahro.

Woodlands earned the trip to the semi-finals after beating St. Michael's Blue Raiders 53-44 in the first round.

Gibson led the team with 14 points followed by Bertrand with 11, St. Kitts and Kavanaugh with 10 each and Hasfal with eight.

The Rams' next tournament game will be on Fri., Jan. 16, at Jarvis Collegiate when they play Lutheran High of Long Island, New York in the New York State-Ontario Invitational Tournament.

# Boxing club wants kids off streets

The Romans believed that a fit body would help the mind stay fit which in turn would stop the citizens of ancient Rome from committing anti-social acts. Sandy Norris also believes that fitness leads to a balanced society and that's why he's forming the Mississauga Athletic Club.

Unfortunately, that fitness philosophy didn't stop the Romans from sinking into decadence as the Roman Empire crumbled. Norris thinks his new club will be a little more successful.

"The aim of the club is to get boys interested and keep them off the street and off dope," Norris says. "It may well cut down on juvenile delinquency."

Norris is planning to open the club Feb. 1 in a converted warehouse at 852 Lakeshore Boulevard West. The club will feature boxing and probably judo, karate and kick box-

ing. But boxing will be the mainstay of the club.

"I've been accosted by boxers in Mississauga who want to turn pro," Norris says. "But the club will also be for boys who want to box as amateurs and boys who just

want to keep fit through boxing. It's physical fitness first at the club and then turning out competitive boxers."

Norris hopes to have two punching bags, an 18-foot ring, showers, weights, press boards, two dressing rooms, 200 lockers and maybe a sauna or two installed at the 4,781 square feet location by Feb. 1.

He has enlisted the help of two former Canadian boxing champions — Don Russell and Colin Fraser — to help out with the coaching.

The club will be open seven days a week. Norris is also trying to get financial support from the businessmen of Mississauga to offset the \$14,000 a year rental costs and the \$12,800 equipment costs for the first year. After that he hopes to get 171 members, whose fee should keep the club financially sound, according to Norris.

Boys from four to seven years of age will be allowed to use the facilities free. The fees for the other age groups range from \$8 a month (for eight to 12-year-olds) to \$15 a month (for over 19s). The fees include a towel and locker. For non-members who want to use the facilities, the fee is \$2 a day.

Norris has wanted to start a boxing club ever since the 1950s when he was an amateur lightweight at the Toronto Newsboys Club. He jokingly says that he received more punishment as a boxer than he dealt out, but believes the club won't be kayoed in its infancy.

"I've wanted to do this for 25 years, but I've only now had the initiative. With the people of Mississauga I shouldn't have any problems with fund-raising."
