Bawden and Reliance Squad Evens Series With Fliers By Winning Fourth Game by 10-4

Score Five Runs in Third Inning to Put Game in Bag

With Johnnie Bawden returning to pitching form and his teammates garnering in five runs in the third inning, the Reliance A.C. bounced back into prominence in the City Softball League finals by trouncing the No. 5 ITS. "Fliers" 10 to 4 to even the series at two games each, in an abbreviated seven-inning contest played before a goodly crowd at the Exhibition Park Tuesday night. As the result of victory for Reliance the best-in-seven series between these two evenly-matched nines con- tinues Thursday evening when a win will give the victor a decided edge in the current series.

Trailing two games to one the Reliance nine pushed five runs across the fourth base in the third inning and were never headed. Most everything happened in the game imaginable, except a home run. Seven extra base hits were counted, of which five were triples with "Spike" Fryke's Reliance nine getting the odd three-base smash in five. The "Fliers" came up with two early-game twin-killings to add spice to the pastime and halt the uprising of the Reliance, but Fryke's nine wasn't to be denied. They made three hits count into five runs in the third, when every- thing went, including Jimmie Bar- riage's stealing of home and Gene LaBonne's two-run producing triple.

Left Hitters Stranded
Twice during the game FO. Warren's Fliers rapped out triples, when Bancroft turned the trick in the second and Muldoon in the fourth. However, Johnnie Bawden rose to the occasion and on both occasions left the extra base hit- ters stranded on the runways with some timely clutch hurling. Bawden struck out six in seven frames and walked four. On the other side of the score sheet nei- ther of Skipper Warren's pitchers whiffed a single Reliance batter, while Bancroft walked five. Bill Kuryluk was rushed into the breach by the slipping Fliers in the sixth after the game was well in hand by Bawden and company.

Fliers Scored First
The Fliers scored first when Kerr opened the second with a single and scored on Bancroft's three-base smash. However, Reliance rallied in the third to cinch matters with five runs as they batted around the official batting order. Two walks, a fielder's choice, singles by Ethier and Bawden and LaBonne's lusty triple to deep right were good enough for the Reliance quintette of runs. The Fliers hove in sight of the score by scoring three in their half of the third as the result of two walks and singles by McKay, Kerr and Bancroft. That ended any resemblance of scoring on the part of the Fliers as Bawden let the Airmen down with but two hits from there in.

Score Two in Fifth
Cy Barriage's single and La- Bonne's triple were good enough for two more runs for Reliance in the fifth as Fryke's gang added a brace more in the sixth on Loft's triple, Bawden's walk and Jim Bar-

riage's one base smash. Incidentally Jim Barriage stole home in the hilarious third, when the winners scored their five runs.

Every member of Reliance col- lected at least a single, except St. Louis, as Ethier led the pack with a triple and a single. Jim Barriage had two singles and Phil Loft a perfect one-for-one, his hit being a three-base clout. LaBonne and Loft also hit triples for the win- ners. Losing pitcher Bill Bancroft led the Fliers on the attack with a triple and single to bat in two runs, while Kerr got two hits, as did Muldoon, who collected a non-pro- ductive triple and a first inning double, that saw him tossed out at the plate from here to yonder.
