ground-which are that every eighth makel of the grain ground shall be retained as a holl-appear to be sufficiently liberal to the miller. On the other hand, the proposal of Capt. Prives, contained in a reent communeation, that the Department or the Library shall payat the rate of 20 cente a bushelfor grinding gram, is an exorbitant charge, and the Defartment could not think of entertaining such a proportion; neither does it appear advisable that the Department should engage in the purchasing of gram, but that it should continue to pur chase from the miller or from others who may get their gram ground at the will such flow aich may require in the locality. m

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
