Ottawa, March 29.—Henri Bourassa, M. P. for Labelle, proved a drawing card to the patrons of the Parliamentary galleries yesterday. He was expected to say something "hot," and this expectation in a measure he fulfilled. His denunciation of the Orangeltes was not notable for its mildness and his appeals for "justice" to the minority was marked by anger rather than selicitude. There was no body to the speech. What was not the froth of rhetoric was the empty rags of prejudice. In argument he was pitfully weak and but for his ludicrous gesticulations and extravagance of language his speech would have fallen very flat. Whirling Epithets.

He denounced the Opposition for its policy of depriving the minerity of its privileges and bestowed a few whirling epithets on certain unnamed person, whom he charged with being responsible for the modification of the school clauses in the bill. Bourassa years, passed away yesterday, after a five months' illness with erysipelas, during which time she was confined in the hospital.

Canada, having contributed nothing to naval establishment, had no right to pose as a critic.
