The new seed of red clover, however, appeared to be a total failure, the alfalfa seedling had taken well, and was making a splendid appearance in spite of drought.

The situation in regard to fruit was far from bright. The berry crop was greatly shortened, although late showers may have shortened the end of the season. Cherries have been in all, and are making a poor to average showing.
