

SUN SHINES ON FRANKFORD FAIR; SEEN BY 2,500

Many Signs of Improvement Upon Grounds—Exhibits First-class

DUST MADE TRACK SLOW Full Programme of Specialties Names of Officials and Prize Winners

All roads led to Frankford on Friday, the day of the annual exhibition of the Frankford Agricultural Society. Ideal weather blessed the efforts of the tireless directors of the association, and not less than two thousand five hundred people paid admission at the gates and crowded around the tracks or inspected the exhibits on the grounds or in the hall. Hundreds of motors were parked inside the oval.

Frankford surprised some of its old-time fair visitors yesterday. They could not fail to notice the evidences of improvement made by the removal of the old board fence and the erection of a wire fence. Not only did it enhance the beauty of the grounds, but it gave a sense of security. The confidence of the directorate was appreciated and there was not a single case to come to the attention of the constables of anyone seeking to gain entrance through the fence. A few if any loitered outside to look in, unless they happened to be passing by. Everybody in the village seemed to be on the grounds.

Frankford race track had got run down until the management this year set to work at great expense to make a track worthy of the fair. Cinders have been placed upon it, and had the weather not been so dry of late, the surface would have been in excellent shape for the trials of speed at the fair. As it was, the going was pretty hard on the noble animals, but spectators admitted that next year the track will be better than it has been in many a year. On Friday the dust was quite heavy, in spite of the fact that the track had been under the roller. This track will be one of the attractions of the fair for years to come.

Whole Countryside There

The whole countryside was there. The word "countryside" seems fitting in this rolling territory where lies some of the most fertile land in the province. The wealth of the townships of Sidney, Rawdon, and Murray was very clearly demonstrated when a glimpse was had at the fine stock and the general appearance of the show.

There was a full program to keep the attention of the visitors wrapped up in the exhibition. The largest midway which has ever been in Frankford was on the grounds and there was no shady dealing allowed by the visiting gentry for the officers saw that the laws as to gambling devices were observed. This gave a sense of security to the avenue.

Perhaps one of the most attractive features was the exhibition of horseback riding by the young yeoman and the boys of the district. It recalled the days when the running race was no small thing at a fall fair. There were several heats and the public had its full share of the events.

Agriculture would have ever made a poor showing without man's noblest friend in the brute creation—the horse. A primitive enough contest was that which was staged in the centre of the grounds, a drawing competition in which a number of teams were competing in hauling a stone boulder laden with rock and bags of cement. The contest was long drawn-out but the spectators' interest never flagged. Mr. B. Perry of Wooler proved that he possessed the best team at the draw.

Stock Makes Good Showing. Horses made a large part of the attraction at the fair. They were in the compound west of the track. The cattle show included a number of fine herds of Polled Angus, Ayrshires, Holsteins and grades. In the swine exhibit were a number of fine animals. The sheep show also deserved a great deal of attention. In poultry the fair was not lacking.

A trip through the big hall showed roots and vegetables of tremendous size, mammoth squash, pumpkins, potatoes, cabbage and corn. The show tables in this building were filled with an exhibit of hundreds of vegetables, such as tomatoes, gourds and vegetable marrow, and with preserved fruit and the most tempting and seemingly appetizing of home-cooking. The upstairs of the hall made an irresistible appeal to the women visitors to the exhibition, for there was on view the fancy work of the ladies of this district. The whole exhibit reached a very high plane and the judges were very complimentary in their references to the articles which they were called upon to inspect. The ladies' work exhibit was one of the

largest in the society's records. The speed trials occupied a great deal of the afternoon. Class "A" was run off in three straight heats, but the "B" Class required the full five to find the prize-money; the first three heats having gone to three different horses. Leo Stewart won the last three heats and the race. This animal is owned by Mr. Marney Sine of Tweed, who also owns the animal that won second money, Hal E.

The time in these events was called very good by the horsemen present, in view of the heavy track, from which clouds of dust arose at the slightest movement. The Rednersville band rendered the music for the afternoon. The big crowd seemed to enjoy itself immensely and manifested interest in all phases of the show. It was not till after evening had set in that it began to disperse.

Last night the festivities were continued, a dance being held in the village. President Clem. H. Ketcheson deserves much credit for the success of the 1921 fair and no small amount should go to Secretary Pollard, who has been indefatigable in his work on the exhibition. The former secretary who gave so much of his time to the society in the past was again doing his share yesterday to make the program a means of entertainment for all the guests of the association—that was Dr. J. U. Simmons.
