The Brokers Report a Fair Volume of Transactions.

PRICES ARE STIFFENING

NEED COMPETING LINES

The Vancouver World of a recent date has the following letter, written by P. A. O'Farrell:

LAURIER HAS A TASK

Will Endeavor to Reconcile Canada and the United States.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 8.—The authorities here have been advised that the arrival of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, premier of Canada, Sir Louis Davies, minister of marine and fisheries in the Laurier cabinet, and other officials of the government, will suggest that the Canadian parliament passed an alien immigration law last spring by which American contractors and American labor was barred from competing in the work on the Crow's Nest Pass railway, a work on the Canadian border, and was daily source of irritation.
