Polo Players Off to New York

NEW YORK, Jan. 15.—Ten English polo players, four of whom will be selected to play in the games of the international match for the Westchester Cup at Meadowbrook in June, will arrive here on May 8. Two weeks later the English polo ponies, thirty-seven in number will arrive here. The cup challengers will come direct from Spain, where they will take part in the early spring practice games. They will have only a month to practice as the first game is scheduled to take place on June 9. Last year the English poloists arrived six weeks before they started. They claim that they began to "stale off" in physical condition just before the games commenced. In order to prevent a similar occurrence this spring the players decided to practice for only a month in this country prior to the opening of the games.

The trainers of the ponies believe that the ponies will show to better advantage under this schedule than if they were allowed to arrive here a month ahead of time. Ten days will just permit them to recover from the effects of the sea voyage and put them on edge for the big matches.

LONDON PATIENT HAS A LEAK IN HIS HEART

Case of Walter Lewis at Victoria Hospital Attracts Much Attention in Medical World.

LONDON, Jan. 15.—A remarkable case of heart trouble which developed in Mr. Walter Lewis, of 56 Wilson avenue, West London, is now being treated at Victoria hospital by Dr. C. H. Reason, and is attracting widespread attention in medical circles.

The young man, a barber, has suffered from the affection for some time, and has been very seriously troubled. The leakage is an extraordinary ailment, and will accordingly require extraordinary treatment. An instrument of the same class as that recently installed by Toronto University is being brought from England to be used upon the case, and will arrive here in a few days. The device will test heart action and will show clearly the exact condition of any organ that the medical man in

attendance may have definite guidance in administering treatment. The thumping of Lewis' heart has been the occasion of great alarm, although he has been about and went to the hospital unassisted yesterday.

The Weather

Stokers who have been stoking the furnaces with coal for two days may lay aside their grimy overalls and ear muffs. The weather is going to be mild. That is, comparatively mild, and for only a short time. The weather man was so impressed with the rise of the thermometer yesterday from 7 degrees below zero at 7 a.m. to 22 degrees above zero at 10 p.m., that he declared the cold snap was broken. In Montreal, however, it was still 12 degrees below zero, while the M.P.s. at Ottawa frisked around in an atmosphere of 12 degrees below zero. Snow was sifting down last night and there will be light falls at intervals for the next day or two.
