## Farmers' Institute Meeting.

### A GRAND SUCCESS.

#### Hall Packed to the Doors.

The supplementary meeting of the East Peterborough Farmers' Institute which was held in the town hall on Saturday afternoon and evening, was a decided success. The speakers delegated to speak at the meetings here were Mr. Robt. Thompson of St. Catharines and Mr. D. Anderson of Rugby.

In the afternoon Mr. Thompson addressed the audience on "Swine Breeding and Feeding." He told of valuable hints in the raising, feeding and marketing of hogs. Mr. Anderson's address was on "Cattle Raising," and he also was listened to attentively.

In the evening the hall was packed to the doors. Mr. Wm. Mathison, chairman, gave a preliminary address, followed by Mr. Chas. O'Reilly of Newwood, the energetic Secretary of the Institute, who, in the course of his remarks, informed the audience that the Institute had decided to hold their next annual meeting at Ottawa.

Miss Watson gave an admirable rendition of an instrumental solo, to which she had to respond again.

Mr. Slater, who made his first appearance in the town hall, was heard to good advantage in a solo "The Blacksmith," and he also responded to an encore.

Mr. Thompson followed with an address on "Hints in Canning Fruits and Vegetables." He advised the ladies to organize a Women's Institute. He said there was nothing more healthy than canned fruits and vegetables and impressed upon his hearers the necessity of cooking them thoroughly. He explained in detail how to proceed in canning, and gave the following recipe for fine grated cheese: Take one pound of cheese, not too fresh and fairly dry, and run it through a sausage chopper twice, take a piece of butter the size of an egg, and one tablespoonful of mustard and mix well together, add 5 or 6 tablespoonfuls of sweet cream and mix all together. He told how to keep eggs fresh for six months if necessary, and gave much more valuable information.

Mr. Jarvis then gave a cornet solo, which demanded an encore as did also Miss M. Graham's vocal solo.

Mr. Anderson was the next on the program with an address on "Farming as an Occupation." Mr. Anderson appeared here before at Institute meetings, and as then, he was a great favorite with the audience, being a very fluent speaker with a delightful Scotch accent. He spoke of so many young men leaving the farm and pointing out the fallacy of so doing and the advantages and independence of farming, who he said were the sons of the soil and the Kings of the earth. He showed by figures the agricultural wealth of the country, far exceeding any other industry. He touched on the importance to young farmers of a life partner in their early career and said that the Dominion of Canada would give a better living to a man than any other country in the world. While a professional career was the goal of many, he pointed out the disadvantages of such a step in a country already crowded with lawyers, doctors, etc. He advised farmers to give their sons a sound education in the common schools, a couple of terms at High School, a course at the Agricultural and the Business College. He illustrated how farmers were perfectly independent of the great mercantile interests, fluctuations of stocks, bonds, etc. Land alone has the power to produce food for the human race and to keep clear of the influence of capital and trusts.

A quintette, composed of Messrs. Jaggis, Cross, Barrett, Williams and L. A. Foster followed with a selection "In the Gloaming," and also an encore.

Messrs. M. Swain and A. E. McGuire brought down the house in a duet "The Upper Ten and the Lower Five," put on in costume.

Rev. Mr. Camp spoke a few words commenting favorably on farm life. Messrs. Swain and McGuire gave another duet.

Among those on the platform were Messrs. Jos. Johnston, Reeve of Belmont, and Jno. Brown of Rockdale.

### Cheese Factory Report.

The following is a condensed report of the business of the Melrose Abbey Cheese factory for the season of 1903:

Total lbs. milk received 2,122,474; total lbs. cheese manufactured, 194,622; amt. received from cheese \$20,382.65; amt. received from whey \$318.24; interests on deposits \$114.05; total proceeds \$20,794.74; expenses manufacturing, drawing, insurance, etc., \$3158.63; patrons totals \$17,636.31.

Patrons were paid by the following monthly averages:—May, milk per lb. cheese 10.93, value per standard, \$25.92; June, milk per lb. cheese, 10.68 value per standard, \$24.37; July, milk per lb. cheese, 11.35, value per standard \$21.45; Aug., milk per lb. cheese, 11.12, value per standard, \$23.50; Sept., milk per lb. cheese, 10.77, value per standard, \$27.90; Oct., milk per lb. cheese, 10.02, value per standard \$24.45; season's average, 10.91, \$24.92.
