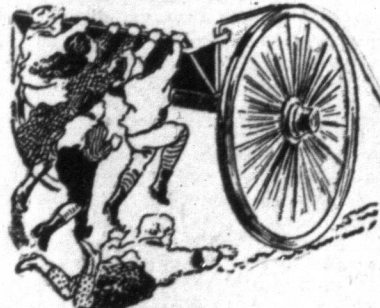

STOLEN THE GIFTS

Gallagher Gave Chatham People Jewelry That He Stole—
Arrested in Toronto.

Chief Holmes received a letter from H. J. Grasset, chief constable of Toronto, on Wednesday evening, notifying him that a man named Thomas Gallagher, a speak thief, had been arrested in Toronto, and a lot of stolen jewelry had been found in his possession. Gallagher has been travelling around the country, stealing goods wherever he went, but at last was rounded up in Toronto.

In the course of his examination he had been in Chatham and given away, to the people with whom he boarded, some of the jewelry he had stolen. He also gave the names of the people to whom he had given the jewelry. Mr. Grasset's purpose of writing to Chief Holmes was the recovery of the stolen goods.

The Chief and Policeman Dezelia visiting the persons mentioned in Mr. Grasset's letter, Wednesday night, and found no difficulty in securing the stolen jewelry. He recovered a number of rings, brooches, pins, etc. The value of the outfit would be about \$15. He sent them to Toronto yesterday morning.

Gallagher was here last winter. He paid his board in money and gave the jewelry away as presents.

THE COLONIAL CONFERENCE

Sir Wilfrid Laurier Presides at
Preliminary Meeting of
Colonial Statesmen.

Canada's Coronation Contin-
gent Sails for Home on
Thursday Next.

London, June 26.—Despite the illness of the King, the preparations for the colonial conference are being proceeded with. It can be easily understood that a meeting of the colonial statesmen in connection with the imperial home advisers of His Majesty is not easily brought about. Therefore the present unique occasion, is felt, must be taken advantage of. Accordingly this afternoon the colonial premiers had a preliminary meeting at the Hotel Cecil. Sir Wilfrid Laurier presided. A short sort of program will be planned and various matters will come in for informal discussion. To-day's meeting will not interfere with Monday's conference at the Colonial Office, which has not been postponed, despite the illness of the king. The colonial premiers, however, have cancelled all previous engagements until the crisis at Buckingham Palace is passed.

THE CORONATION CONTINGENT.
It is stated today that the Canadian coronation contingent will return to the Dominion, on July 3. They, of course share in the general disappointment incident upon the postponement of the coronation.

THE CANADIAN HONORS.
The Canadian share of the coronation honors is favorably commented on, and the recipients of titles, now in London, are being warmly congratulated in Anglo-Canadian circles. Gilbert Parker, as a native Canadian and a member of the British House of Commons, comes in for special congratulation. Dr. Borden's knighthood is the outcome of his administration of the Canadian militia department during the period of the South African war, while Mr. Mulock's efforts in connection with imperial penny postage are recognized. Dealing with the honors bestowed on Gilbert Parker, the St. James' Gazette says that "he has not only made the question of imperial trade his own, but by his charming writings, he has done much to give the people of Great Britain an insight into the life and habits and thought of those most interesting sons of the empire, the French Canadians." In addition to the Canadians honored with the distinction of Companion of the Order of St. Michael and St. George and whose names were cables last evening, the Gazette also contains the names of Capt. Gifford, Newfoundland; and Major Hudson, R. C. A., Kingston, who received the decoration in recognition of his services in South Africa.

INSPECTED BY DUNDONALD.
Major General the Earl of Dundonald, who has been appointed to the position of general staff officer commanding the militia in Canada in succession to Major-General O'Grady-Haly, inspected the Canadians at the Alexandra Palace yesterday. He highly complimented the Queen's Own Rifle Band for the soldierly appearance of its members and its excellent marching music.

LAURIER WELL AGAIN.
Sir W. Laurier, it is announced at the Hotel Cecil to-day, has recovered his normal health. He has been somewhat indisposed since his arrival owing to the rough ocean trip and fatigue incidental to the trying events of this week, in London.

LATEST NEWS THE BEST

London, June 27.—2.27 p. m. It is said that after the issue of this morning's bulletin Lord Marcus Beresford asked Lord Lister how the King was progressing and that Lord Lister replied: "His Majesty is practically out of danger."

London, June 27.—2 p. m.—His Majesty passed a comfortable morning. All his symptoms to-day are so far satisfactory. His temperature remains normal. No other than important fluctuations in His Majesty's temperature will be recorded in the bulletins issued. (Signed) Treves, Laking, Barlow.

London, June 27.—10.15 a. m.—His Majesty had a fair night and has had some natural sleep. His appetite is improving and his wound is much more comfortable. On the whole, the King's condition is attended with less anxiety. (Signed) Lister, Treves, Smith, Laking, Barlow.

CABLES GIVE GOOD NEWS CONCERNING KING'S CONDITION

To-day's Despatches are Especially Cheering—His Majesty
Progresses Rapidly Towards Recovery.

Writes Telegrams and Notes and Attends to Matters of State
—Passes a Comfortable Day and has a Peaceful Sleep.

The Physicians Satisfied, and the Royal Household Delighted
and Astonished and Delighted at the King's Progress.

Much Quiet Rejoicing in London—Considerable Speculation
Regarding the Coronation.

London, June 26 — (Midnight.) — Those around King Edward continue to be astonished at his rapid recovery. The slightly annoying symptoms mentioned in the bulletin issued at 11 o'clock to-night are quite inconsequential compared to the fact which the Associated Press has learned that His Majesty again took food to-night and was afterwards allowed to smoke a cigar. The last bulletin posted at Buckingham Palace, at 11 o'clock to-night, reads:—

"The King has passed a fairly comfortable day and has maintained his strength. There is a returning desire for food, which has been very carefully given. There has been some return of pain in the wound. (Signed) Treves, Laking, Barlow."

Queen Alexandra sat with her husband all the evening, and only left him after he had fallen into peaceful sleep. Mention by the King's doctors of the care with which food is administered to the royal patient and of the return of the pain in the wound, can safely be taken as merely an earnest of their conscientious intention to make public the slightest adverse symptom, however unimportant. The King's courage and good temper are remarkable, and to-day he personally wrote several telegrams and one or two notes. As evidence of the King's persistent refusal to efface himself from his connection with state affairs, and in corroboration of the statement that the physicians are satisfied with their patient's condition the Associated Press learns that, besides personally opening telegrams on Wednesday evening, King Edward then insisted upon a final inspection of the honor list. There was one appointment of considerable importance which had not been definitely decided at that time. The King approved this nomination, and gave the final order to the department interested, thus saving one of the recipients of honor from severe disappointment. To-night King Edward is

than he was last night or this morning. The return of pain in his wound is not accompanied by any appreciable increase of temperature. In fact, King Edward's doctors are inclined to regard the patient's pain and appetite as healthful symptoms.

To these hopes of a favorable issue of the King's illness no less an authority than the Queen gives encouragement. Writing to the Lord Mayor of London, Sir Joseph C. Dimsdale, to-day, to thank him for his expression of sympathy of the city of London, Queen Alexandra says, through her secretary:—"The Queen rejoices to think that the bulletin of this morning gives a favorable report of the King."

Following the expressed desire of the Prince of Wales, the arrangements for illuminating the city, which involved the costly erection of set pieces for electric and gaslights, will be allowed to remain, and will be utilized "immediately it is authoritatively announced that the King is out of danger." By the King's personal desire the royal pardons of offenders in the army will go into effect just as if the coronation had occurred. This last intimation suitably brings to a close the day which was to have been notable in English history, and which, from the viewpoint of the public, has passed in that mediocrity which is attached to all things that are neither wholly good nor wholly bad.

THE STRIKING FEATURE
of coronation day, as it is still called, was the universal substitution of services of intercession for those of rejoicing. These services occurred

ham Palace was closed up for the night rather later than usual. It is understood, however, that the King's strength and progress are maintained, and it is not anticipated that there will be any necessity of issuing another bulletin before half-past ten this morning.
