LAND OF THE HUMMING-BIRD

The Surprising Phenomenon That Follow Digging in Trinidad's Asphalt Lake, Few people who travel over the asphalted streets of New York are aware of the origin of the black, pitchy mass that goes to make up the basis of the smooth roadway under their feet. Eighteen hundred almost due south from New York lies the little tropical island of Trinidad a British possession off the coast of northern South America. At the south-western extremity of this colony the famous Pitch Lake is located on the summit of a small hill, less than two hundred feet above the level of the sea. In appearance there is nothing phenomenal about this wonder of the tropics but a visit to the lake as it is familiarly called, reveals one of the most unaccountable oddities of nature in the annals of travel.

The tourist may take passage to the "land of the humming-bird"—is Trinidad people like their country to be called—and after securing accommodation at the only decent hotel in the colony, proceed to the lake by one of the small Government steamers plying coastwise three times weekly, disembark at the Brighton weekly, plying coastwise three times weekly disembark at the Brighton pier, and proceed to the scene of "diggind." Of all the crude, rough, and ready means of extracting wealth from mother earth, the Trinidad Lake asphalt operations are the most striking. The ations are the most striking. The visitor arrives on a fairly level plateau, spotted here and there with teau, spotted here and there with tiny pools of water, beneath which the soft shiny substance known as asphalt glitters in the reflection of a fierce tropical sun. Scattered over the surface of the lake dozens of swarthy negroes are plying nick, and here. negroes are plying pick and hoe, ex-tracting the tar-coaly looking stuff from the earth. One may sit in the shade of a near-by shrub, or under the protecting shelter of an umbrella the protecting shelter of an umbretta, and watch the negroes pile heap after heap of the asphalt into the endless chain; of tubs that hurry along to the pier, from which one has but recently landed, until a yawning excavation of twenty or more feet sugarter to the supervising darky that. gests to the supervising darky that. the time has come to move a bit fur-ther on. In the course of a few hours the excavation resulting from morning's diggings begins to look less deep, and by eventide the spot from which more than five or ten tons which more than five or ten tons have been dug is again level with the surrounding earth and ready to be dug over by the gang of noisy blacks. which We Drink or Handle Daily. The colossal case of arsenic poisoning at Manchester calls attention in a startling manner to the risks we all run even in our own homes. Thousands of tons of poison are now used in the manufacturing arts, including a quantity of arsenic

sands of tons of poison are now used in the manufacturing arts, including a quantity of arsenic.

According to the Registrar-General, only twelve or fourteen deaths occur annually from arsenic in England most of them being accidental. But medical men, who have enquired into the matter, assert that an immense amount of ill-health arises from the use of this drug, which may be innocently taken at lunch time or absorbed in the bedroom.

This is perfectly credible when we consider the various uses to which the drug is put. It is used in making shot. Three parts of arsenic are combined with 1,000 parts of lead to make ordinary shot. Now, shot is extensively used in washing bottles, and in this process a good deal of the arsenic gets detached and adheres to the bottles. When these are filled with beer the arsenic dissolves in the beverage, and, though the quantity is too small to injure a moderate drinker, it often seriously affects the health.

To understand how these infinitesimal quantities of arsenic prove harmful, a curious property of the drug must be explained. It is what the doctors call "cumulative" in its action. That is to say, when a dose is swallowed, it sticks tenaciously in the body, and though the body gets rid of a little of it every day, it takes from two to six weeks to eliminate the whole.

Green-backed playing cards very often contain arsenic, and many great card-players get an eruption on their hands from this source.

Theatre tickets, railway tickets, omnibus tickets are also frequently coloured with a pigment containing this dangerous chemical. It is much used in the manufacture of artificial flowers, and it comes away from them, as from wall-papers, both in the form of dust and as a gas called "arsine." It is also used in the colouring of children's toys, crayons, candles, the glazed papers that cover confectionery, lamp shades, and many toilet articles. Violet powder frequently contains arsenic, and some time age two children were fatally poisoned by the use of this powder. the use of this powder.

Arsenical soap is greatly favoured by ladies vain of their skin. Undoubtedly arsenic has the effect, if properly used, of beautifying the skin. But very often the soap causes a nasty rash through its poisonous qualities, and it helps all the other things in producing ill-health.

Arsenic is very often present in gloves, stockings, and hat linings, and causes a rash, or gets into the system. Perhaps one of the most dangerous poison-carriers is the coloured window or bed curtain.

or bed curtain.

There seems to be no end to the articles of daily use which may be the mysterious cause of stomach aches, sore eyes, neuralgia, and other results sore eyes, neuralgia, and other results of chronic arsenic poisoning. Britannia metal spoons, forks, and teapots frequently contain arsenic, which is slowly dissolved out of them in use. All kinds of glassware may have some arsenic in their substance, though not so often now as formerly. It is used in bronzing brassware and tinning sheet-iron. Orpiment, an arsenical compound, is used as a hair destroyer, and tanners often use it to take the hair off skins. Several deaths have been traced to it. Arsenite of copper is used, under the name of paris green, for destroying insects on copper is used, under the name of paris green, for destroying insects on potatoes. Possibly it finds its way into the tuber, and is eaten by us at dinner. Corn intended for seed is steeped in an arsenical solution to prevent "smut," and here, again, there is some probability that the drug passes into the new corn, and thus into our bread. American apples are washed with arsenic to prevent decay. Then, most sheep dips consist of arsenic, and it is almost certain that some of it gets into the sheep's body and remains is the mutton; while fly-papers, fly-water, and rat pastes body and remains is the mutton, while fly-papers, fly-water, and rat pastes owe their destructive power to arsenic and when used in a house some of the poison passes into the air. To mention one more source of danger immense quantities of arsenic are thrown into the holds of ships to pre-

thrown into the holds of ships to prevent vegetation, and nothing is more likely than that corn subsequently loaded in bulk gets contaminated. In most cases, however, it is consoling to know that the trifling quantities of arsenic we accidentally take into our system do more good harm. It is an excellent tonic, and promotes health when taken in suitable quantity. The symptoms of slight chronic poisoning are unfortunately easily taken for something else. One victim always had a cold in his head, and thought it arose from draughts in his office, but it was really due to irritating effects of arsenic, which fact he did not discover till his health was undermined. Most people feel their eyes sore, as if there were sand in them, usually the stomach is in an inflamed condition, but were sand in them, usually the stomach is in an inflamed condition, but this is put down to ordinary dyspepsia. Neuralgia, headache, and depression of spirits are other symptoms. But no one thinks of arsenic poisoning when he suffers from these.
