SLAYS WIFE AND BABES

Farmer Near Gananoque Commits Murder, Then Suicides.

Kills Family With Hammer—Then Cuts His Own Throat—Left Pathetic Note Excusing His Crime—Suffering From Ill-Health and Betrayed by Friends—Feared Scoff of the World for Them.

Gananoque, May 14.—William Waldie, aged 38, a farmer, living a few miles east of Gananoque, killed his wife and two children with a hammer yesterday morning, knocking their brains out while they were asleep. The children were aged 2 and 4. He then went downstairs and wrote a note, which he left on the table, then went upstairs and cut his own throat from ear to ear. He told the hired man, Shipman, who went to the factory with milk, if he did not see him when he came back to go upstairs and he would find him. Not finding him, he went as requested.

The Bodies Found.
In the room where the deed was done were one bed and a cot. In the bed was lying the man who committed the murder. Beside him lay his wife with a dent in her head. In the cot were the two children with holes in their heads and dead. The floor of the bedroom was a mass of blood. In front of the bed was a table where Waldie apparently had stood while cutting his throat, then lay on the bed alongside his wife.

He tried on Saturday last to sell his farm to a neighbor. He was highly respected by all residents.

Mrs. Waldie is a daughter of Noah Peck, deputy reeve of Leeds and Lansdowne. Waldie was always very fond of his wife and children.

Left Signed Note.
This is a copy of his note: "Upstairs will be found the work of a mental and physical wreck, a maniac for the last two years, unknown to anyone but myself, I suspect. Would to God I had never been born. I have killed the dearest woman and unborn baby and the two sweetest of children. I had intended to kill only myself, but I could not at the last leave them the soul of the world. I have been hoodwinked by those who should have been my friends, and can see no future, as I am utterly unable to manage myself or to accomplish my work."

LAWYER ADVISED TO STEAL.

Confession of Former Loan Clerk Made Public.

New York, May 14.—Details of a confession made by Wm. C. Douglas, former loan clerk of the Trust Co. of America, made public yesterday, are to the effect that acting on the advice of a lawyer, he planned to steal \$1,000,000 of securities in order to compel the Trust Co. to conceal his minor theft.

Douglas has already pleaded guilty to larceny, and is awaiting sentence. According to his confession he first took small quantities of bonds and, borrowing money on them, lost it in speculation. When it was evident that he could not retrieve his losses, a lawyer was consulted, who advised that the only way out of the dilemma was to steal \$1,000,000 worth of securities, and turn them over to the lawyer, who might negotiate with the officials of the trust company for their return. Douglas' understanding was that the lawyer expected to get \$200,000 from the trust company for the restoration of the securities, which would have been sufficient to cover the amount Douglas had already borrowed and lost.

GRAND JURY FIND TRUE BILL.

Jackson to Stand Trial for Causing Sister-in-Law's Death.

Orangeville, May 14.—The grand jury, after three hours' deliberation, returned a "true bill" in the case of the King v. Walter Jackson.

Jackson is charged with being implicated in the death of his sister-in-law, Lizzie Wells, last summer, by causing her to be drugged.

The Chief Justice addressed the grand jury at some length on the only criminal case to come before them, King v. Jackson, explaining very fully the law relating to such matters. About a dozen witnesses were examined. The court then adjourned until to-day.

Frank E. Hodgins is crown attorney and J. W. Curry, K. C., acts for the defence.

Refuse to Become Citizens.

Ottawa, May 14.—Rev. Dr. John McDougall, commissioner to the Doukhobors, is in Ottawa to report to the government. He says that, owing to the decree that the Doukhobors must become citizens of Canada or live in reserves. Quite large tracts of land now held by them under favored conditions will be thrown open to settlement. After their eight years in Canada only about one-ninth of the Doukhobors decided to become Canadian citizens. The tenet they held to was, "God is our king; we cannot become subject to any earthly sovereign." Thus they refuse to become owners of the land they have tillied.

Train Derailed.

Columbus, Ohio, May 14.—Dashing through an open switch at Truro station, 12 miles southeast of Columbus yesterday, the West Virginia express on the Ohio Central Railroad, was derailed. One man, who was walking along the side of the track, was killed, Michael Martin, the engineer, who was pinned under his engine, will die, as will also Daniel Martin, the fireman, and an unknown woman.

Twenty Years for Burglary.

Winnipeg, May 14.—One of the largest penalties for burglary ever known to have been given here, was meted out to Fred Hawkins, alias Stevens, yesterday, when he was sentenced to 20 years in the penitentiary. Hawkins pleaded guilty to a number of daring burglaries.

HATCHING A REVOLUTION.

General Toledo to Lead Expedition Against Cabrera.

Mexico City, May 13.—It has been learned that Gen. Salvador Toledo, who assisted Gen. Barrillas in the last Guatemalan revolution, and who is designated as the leader of the coming revolution against the Cabrera Government of Guatemala, is now en route to New Orleans, and will come to Mexico within a week or ten days.

Every Guatemalan revolutionary junta in Central America and in the United States and Mexico is now actively at work on plans for the new revolution against President Cabrera, and it is believed that actual fighting in Guatemala will begin within thirty days.

Gen. Toledo is said to have completed arrangements for the invasion of Guatemala from the Honduran border before leaving Mesilla, Nicaragua, where he has been stationed for some time past. Further arrangements will be made in New Orleans, and from that place he will proceed to Mexico to confer with the Guatemalan exiles in this city.

It is now almost certain that he will lead the new movement against Guatemala. It is also asserted that upon his arrival here the provisional Government, which has been contemplated for some time, will be organized, with Gen. Toledo as provisionary President.

According to the refugees, a veritable reign of terror now exists in Guatemala. It is stated that more than 10,000 of the wealthy and business classes have left Guatemala since the alleged attempt on President Cabrera's life two weeks ago. Every vessel leaving San Jose for Mexican ports is crowded by the fleeing people.

The stories of the atrocities practiced in the overcrowded prisons are revolting in the extreme.

Cabrera, it was learned, has now 30,000 troops on the Mexican border, and 11,000 more on the Honduran frontier.

The situation in this city is unchanged. Officialdom regards the Guatemala affair as a closed incident as far as Mexico is concerned.

SHOULD FAVOR COLONIES.

Austin Chamberlain Leads Attack On Government Policy.

London, May 14.—In the House of Commons, on the second reading of the Finance Bill, Austin Chamberlain moved an official tariff reform amendment. He dealt with the general question of taxation and criticized the attitude of the Government towards the colonial demand for preference. The demands of the colonies he thought had been refused almost brutally. The Opposition were anxious not to repel the first united advance for closer union with the colonies. No juggling with the income tax would meet the case. He laid it against the British fiscal system that it acted as a handicap to trade and commerce, wages and employment, and suggested the imposition of duties on imported manufactured goods.

Lyttelton also condemned the action of the Government regarding the colonial conference, while Jesse Collins ridiculed the statement by Austen Chamberlain that the question had been finally settled by the last election.

McKenna and Burton replied on behalf of the Government, the latter arguing that the financial system of Britain was sounder now than for years. If Britain adopted preference, retaliation or protection, it would lead her into a hopeless chaos.

The debate was adjourned. In the House of Commons Sir Stanley stated that the president of the board of agriculture had read Laurier's speech in reference to the importation of cattle and would of course give most respectful attention to the representations made by him.

WANT VOTE OF CONFIDENCE.

French Government's Policy Toward Labor.

Paris, May 14.—When the Chamber of Deputies reassembled yesterday, Education Minister Briand replied to further interpellations of the Government, on the latter's policy towards labor. He declared that the Ministers had acted in the true interests of both the public and the working people in suppressing the violence and the tyranny of the revolutionary general confederation of labor, and expressed his determination, with the fullest approval of his colleagues, not to permit any attempt at insubordination on the part of the school teachers or other officials.

Continuing, M. Briand said: the Government categorically refused to authorize the school teachers and other state officials to form the unions which the general federation of labor desired in order to provoke confusion and disorder through the officials appearing to the country to be over the heads of the Cabinet Ministers. The Government desired to overcome anarchy by means of order and discipline, thus avoiding certain reaction. If the chamber did not support the Government's disciplinary measures the Ministers would not retain their portfolios. The debate was adjourned until to-day, when the Government will ask for a vote of confidence.

REFORM COLONIAL OFFICE.

Deskin Would Preside, For Periodic Interchange of Officials.

London, May 14.—(O. A. P.)—The Canadian Associated Press learns that Premier Deskin at to-day's sitting of the conference will propose there should be a reconstruction of the Colonial Office so as to provide for a periodic interchange of officials between Downing street and the various parts of the empire.

The Canadian Associated Press understands it has been decided to publish in extenso the proceedings of the Colonial Conference; the publication will be at an early date but the speeches will require some revision before publication.

Mr. Winston Churchill, replying to a question said the Colonial Premiers made clear to the Government that as their policy was to protect their position from British and foreign competition they could not in any way reciprocate the free unrestricted import afforded them in this country, on the other hand, His Majesty's Government were not prepared to place a tax on foreign imports for the purpose of conferring further advantages on the self-governing colonies.

REVOLUTIONARIES AWED.

Sudden Show of Military Force at Lahore Makes the City Quiet.

Lahore, India, May 14.—The sudden and swift display of military force by the British authorities has dumbfounded the revolutionaries, and the arrest and deportation of Lala Rajpal Rai, the chief anti-British agitator, has paralyzed the organization of the revolutionary movement, which is now without a leader. The troops were out all Friday night. But the city, hitherto the scene of nightly excitement, inflammatory oratory and processions, slept in unbroken stillness. The streets were utterly deserted.

The Pioneer welcomes the action of the Government of the Punjab, but doubts the necessity or advisability of a frequent repetition of strong measures. It says the present situation is not critical or serious if it is firmly treated in the ordinary way.

Unionist Gets a Seat.

London, May 14.—The bye-election for a member of Parliament from the Stepney division of Tower Hamlets, to fill the seat made vacant by the retirement of Sir W. Evans Gordon, Unionist, who resigned on account of ill-health, resulted in a victory for the Unionist candidate, F. Leverton Lewis.

The election was hotly contested along the lines of the great political issues. Mr. Harris polled 2,399 votes, against 1,350 cast for Ben Cooper, the Liberal-Labor candidate. The Unionist majority obtained by Sir W. Evans Gordon was reduced by 312 votes.

Reported Victory for Sultan.

Melilla, Morocco, May 14.—It is rumored here that the army of the Sultan has won a victory over the forces of the Pretender near Marchica. The casualties on both sides are reported to be heavy, and the Government troops are said to have captured 200 prisoners.
