Local and Provincial.

Wolfville Division expect a fraternal visit from Canning Division on Monday evening.

Gaspereaux are to be seen in the St. John market and are selling at 5 cents apiece.

The Local Legislature prorogued on Monday after a short and comparatively uneventful session.

Owners of ice-houses are putting in a sufficient supply to provide for next summer. The ice is of an excellent quality.

The weather has been decidedly cold this week. The mercury got down to 8 degrees below zero on Tuesday night, which was probably the coldest of the season.

The bkts. Bahama, of Canning, J. B. Tooker, master, sailed from Cardenas, Cuba, Jan. 8th, for Apalachicola, Fla., loaded with a full cargo of pitch pine lumber, and arrived back to Cardenas on Feb. 1st, making the round voyage in the quick time of twenty-four days.

On Tuesday evening next Rev. J. W. Fisher, of Canning, is to deliver a lecture in the Baptist church, under the auspices of Acadia Lodge, I. O. G. T. The amount of freight carried during the same period amounted to 110,821 1/2 tons.
