Morning Telegrams.

The *Lincoln*, the Caesar's yacht, left the
Clayton for Friday for the coast. Owing to
the high speed she was proved able to at-
tain the Russian Government has paid the
builders a bonus of \$40,000.

A Paris correspondent telegraphs that
on Saturday the execution of the decrees
will begin with the Carmelites in Paris
and about a dozen departments.

The execution of Dulcinea is likely to be
carried out shortly, Osman Pasha having
been appointed by the Porte to effect its
execution. The Turks have laid torpedoes
in Smyrna harbor. The vessels of the
international fleet have been ordered
home, and no further naval proceeding are
expected.

The *Seafarer* announces that another
steamer to Buenos Aires is to be ordered. The
ship has been selected in Dunelm and Mrs. D.
O. Hill has been named the model.

Hartmann, the nihilist, telegraphs a full
description of the man who was to blow
up the Imperial Palace at Alexandria. The
ship failed, because some before the pas-
sage of the train a carriage came along the
line and cut the wire connecting the dynamite
with the battery. Hartmann asserts
that there are 500,000 organized bodies in
Russia.

The following are stated to be the facts
reporting the Caesar's marriage on the 19th
(old style): The marriage with the Prin-
cess Dolgorouki was solemnized in the
chapel of the Imperial Palace. The Caesar's
family disapproving of the Caesar's wish to
Hosop on the eastern coast, and the
Grand Duke Constantine and Vladimir
went abroad in order that they might not
witness the ceremony. The Caesar purchased
for his consort the palace of the Grand
Duchess Catharina, paying two million
roubles for it.
