BOLSHEVIKI IN REIGN OF TERROR

Human Life Has Lost All Value; "Executions" Without Trials.

Stockholm, Sept. 2.—Via London. Sept. 9.—Bolshevik Russia is suffering the consequences of class hatred in their most violent expression. Human life has lost all value, and foreigners and Russians alike are at the mercy of officials who kill without trial. Such were the conditions at any rate when the Associated Press correspondent at Moscow left Russia recently and traveled hence with the party of American refugees that has arrived here.

Since War Minister Trotsky provoked the Czechoslovak opposition by breaking his pledge to let the Czechoslovaks leave Russia in peace, the class hatred upon which Bolshevism is based has revealed itself in its full horror. Before the Social Revolutionary party broke with the Bolsheviks it acted as a check upon capital punishment. Threatened by the victorious Czechoslovaks on the Volga, the Entente enterprise from Archangel and in Siberia and general internal uprising, the Bolshevik leaders now are madly prodding their suspected opponents and filling the prisons with hostages.

In the Bolshevik official bulletins the acts of the Bolshevik authorities are described as war measures necessary to protect the Soviet Republic. To an unbiased foreigner who has watched the rise and decline of the Bolshevik power they appear as the brutal efforts of ambitious leaders to perpetuate the rule of a minority so small and so unjust that it could not maintain itself for a single day without the aid of armed force.

BATTLE ENTERS A NEW PHASE

Battered German Armies Are Attempting to Make a Stand Near the Hindenburg Line

London, Sept. 10.—The battle on the western front is entering a new phase. The enemy at last is making a serious stand just short of the series of positions called the Hindenburg line, positions which, however, have been bitten into by the British from the Senne to Moeuvres and touched by the French in the St. Gobain region at Servais and Bassoles-Aulieres.

The Germans are doubling their rear-guards and seeking by counter-attacks to slow up, as they cannot stop outright, the encroaching tide of the Allies. Their efforts have been in vain, notwithstanding the new measures adopted to check the advance of the French and British, for both pushed forward yesterday in the direction of St. Quentin. The French made such progress across the Great Canal that the enemy no longer can hope to defend it.

General Humbert's centre is at the gates of La Fere, and General Mangin's left is beginning to creep around the St. Gobain Forest by the west, while his right beat off attacks by which the Germans hoped to cling to the Aisne front. More of such attacks are probable, but General Mangin will know how to deal with them. They are local affairs, and a more serious effect is not likely to be made.

General Ludendorff is working for the respite which he must have if he is to sort out his disorganized divisions and try and whip up some sort of a strategic reserve. This respite he hopes his shortened line, requiring fewer men in the line, will give him. Marshal Foch is likely to be aware, however, where the enemy is sufficiently weakened and demoralized to be smashed in at some part of the present battlefield, or whether a stroke elsewhere would be advisable, thus giving the armies that have fought so indefatigably for the last two months a rest.

New York, Sept. 10.—The unfilled orders of the United States Steel Corporation on August 31 were \$759,042 tons, according to the corporation's monthly statement issued today. This is a decrease of 124,759 tons, compared with the orders on July 31.
