### Summary of Night Dispatches

Edmonton, April 25.—Hon. A. J. McKay, Minister of Municipal Affairs in the provincial Government of Alberta, died Sunday morning of pneumonia.

Threatens British Strike. Manchester, April 25.—Eighty-one thousand cotton operatives favor strike this week in Lancashire if demands for sixty per cent. advance in wages are not granted. It is hoped that a settlement may be reached before strike takes place.

London, April 25.—The Bolshevik foreign minister has sent a formal proposal to open peace negotiations to Czechoslovakia.

Control of Foodstuffs. Ottawa, April 25.—It was announced last night that a move to place control of all commercial foodstuffs entirely in the hands of the federal Department of Agriculture is to be made in the House next week.

Dutch Strike Failed. The Hague, April 25.—The strike of Rotterdam and Amsterdam transport workers, which lasted ten weeks, was ended Saturday, when the men resumed work under old conditions.

The Blockade of Finns. Helsingfors, April 25.—Finns in again securely blockaded by land and sea, following a raid by D'Annunzio's soldiers on Abkhazia, west of the city.

British Mandate for Palestine. San Remo, April 25.—The supreme council gave the mandate for Palestine to Great Britain and will send a request to the United States to accept the mandate for Armenia. An Adriatic settlement was proposed along the lines of President Wilson's December 8th note. Will, however, the latter point brought French and British objections to which Premier Nitti of Italy will give a final answer today.

Whole Family Slain. Turtle Lake, N. D., April 24.—Eight persons were found dead Saturday on the farm of Jacob Walk, near here. Indications were that the whole family, except an eight-month-old baby, were slain with a hatchet.

U. S. Congress a Failure. Washington, April 25.—Scathing charges that the present congress has failed to do anything for the country, "completeness and abandonment" is made by Samuel Gompers in the current issue of the American Federationist.

Secure Huge Plant. Ottawa, April 25.—Word reached here today that a strong group of Toronto and Montreal industrial interests had been successful in securing the huge plant of the British Chemicals, Limited, formerly operated by the Imperial Munitions Board at Trenton, Ont. Plant and equipment cover an area of 225 acres and were installed at a cost of over five million.

(Continued from Page Three). (For this matter has now been committed to our hands, give that encouragement and hand out to the taxpayers, not except only, but example; let us mark, let us stamp our day in this House as the beginning of a broader time.

Serious Situation; No Further Neglect. My hon. friend from the County of St. John, in his speech last year when the matter for education was under discussion, told the House that he did not blame the present government more than former governments for their attitude towards education. Let that be the view of all of us. Let our realization of neglect in the past quicken in us a sense of the responsibilities which rest upon us in the present hour.

Seldom, perhaps never in the history of this province, I assert, and I measure my words, has a Legislature been met by a more serious situation than the one which now confronts us. Let us meet it; let us meet it with a unity of spirit and of action, with a singleness of purpose worthy of representatives of a disorganizing and a divided people.
