But, notwithstanding the six-tenths of a cent additional duty per pound on refined sugar, that sugar has been sold in Montreal for less than it could have been imported for at that particular time had the old tariff remained in operation. (Applause.) As to the monopoly which is claimed to exist, it must not be forgotten that there will soon be four refineries in operation in Canada instead of one. But apart from that fact, and from the advantages which Montreal and the people of Ontario gain by the manufacture of sugar here, there are advantages which the people of the hastern provinces derive. Under the old afrangement, if the people down there were sending lumber or fish from St. John to the West Indies they would have to pay a high rate of freight, because there was no eturn cargo. The profits of the fishermen ama lumbermen were, of course, increased or decreased in proportion to the freight they had to pay upon their exports, and if freights was low the profits were larger than if freights were high. To-day, by reason of the fact that vessels carrying lumber and fish could get return cargoes of sugar, the rate of freight was lower than it would be were there no purchases of sugar direct from the West Indies, which would be the case if we did not refine for ourselves.
