Emery had arranged with his accomplice to lead Garcia into the hands of a waiting posse led by the sheriff himself. This was done, but when Garcia saw Emery he drew two revolvers and opened fire on the sheriff. His aim was erratic, and he soon fell, his wrist and side pierced by bullets from the detectives' revolvers.
