Ryerson Officials Anxious to Assist Authorities But Dislike Discrimination.

Neither the way in which action was taken nor the method adopted to give the people of Ryerson Methodist Church notice that their church was to be quarantined, gave the officials any opportunity to notify the congregation of what the Barton Board of Health had done.
