WE HAVE NEW STATUS

Change in British Colonial Department on Sir Willfrid's Suggestion

London, Nov. 15.—Lord Elgin's despatch to Earl Grey and other governors, dated September 21, was published here today in the form of a formal recognition of the new status of Canada, Australia, New Zealand and South Africa as dominions of the King, as distinct from the crown colonies of the West Indies. These dominions have now their own departments in the colonial office, Sir Willfrid Laurier's principle of ministerial responsibility for secretaries of state for the dominions was carried out, while Mr. Denkin's plans for separate and independent secretaries were in and ready for the imperial conference, and financed by the conference, was rejected.

The Edmonton, Dunvegan and British Columbia railway will apply to parliament next session for an extension of time.

Portage Approves New Freight Rates

Portage, Man., Nov. 16.—At a meeting of the board of trade this morning it was decided to wire the railway commission asking that there be no delay in putting the new C. P. R. freight tariff into effect. It is now felt here that Portage can compete for jobbing trade in the own territory with Winnipeg houses. It is expected that there will be a vigorous protest from Winnipeg.

Big Failures in Russia

Danvic, Russia, Nov. 15.—Two lumber firms, Albert & Co., and L. Goldhar, suspended payments today. The liabilities of the former are about eight hundred thousand marks (about \$200,000), and the indebtedness of the latter is over 1,000,000 marks (\$250,000).

Oil Well in Manitoba

Riding Mountain, Nov. 15.—An extraordinary rich oil well has been struck here which gives promise of a great yield. A company of some twenty-five investors has been formed, including Hon. John Crawford, who Neepawa, and operations will be commenced tomorrow. Local inhabitants are enthusiastic over the prospects opened up.

Not Much Work Will Be Done in Yukon, Before Spring

60 Per Cent. More Cars

Winnipeg, Nov. 15.—A statement with respect to the present alleged car shortage extracted from the latest C. P. R. reports available for the week ending November 12, indicates that there are now fifty per cent. more cars available for grain load during this period than during the same period in the years 1905 and 1906, and that the average amount of wheat loaded is fifty per cent. greater than in the year 1906. Although the grain started to move much later this year than last, in fact three weeks later in Saskatchewan, the amount of grain in store in the country elevated on November 12 this year is exactly half the amount in store on that date in the year 1905, and a little more than one-third of the amount in store at this time last year.

Agree of Bookies Sustained

Toronto, Nov. 15.—The court of appeal has quashed the conviction of two bookies who took bets at a Woodbine race track at the spring meeting. The court held that where the bookie moves about and does not occupy a booth the law is inoperative.

Copper Strike Near Selkirk

Dawson, Y.T., Nov. 16.—A new copper strike has been made a few miles south of Selkirk, and a number of claims have been staked. The news was brought by Major Wood.
