

CITIES EXHIBIT AT THE TORONTO FAIR

Edmonton and Calgary Will Display Produce and Resources of the District at Industrial Exhibition—List of Exhibit Will Be Wide.

The exhibit at the Dominion Fair at Toronto, which amounted to some \$700,000, was collected with a view of care and is considered one of the best exhibits ever prepared in the district. It includes grains, grasses, resources and vegetables. It leaves today with the bulk of the exhibit and the balance, consisting mainly of vegetables, will be taken express.

What Exhibit Embraces.
