Asquith's Appeal Succeeding.

LONDON, Dec. 6.

At the close of to-day's pollings the complexion of the House of Commons stood as follows: Government coalition, Liberals, 106; Laborites, 20; Nationalists, 26. Total 152. Opposition Unionists, 147. A situation has been developed which is the result of the close contest of the ranks between the Government coalition parties and the Unionists. The pendulum slowly swings towards the Government to-day, and the result of three days voting, in which 239 seats have been filled, gives the coalition one more member than they had in the last Parliament. Up to last night the Unionists had a clear gain of 5. The returns to-night showed that the Unionists had regained St. Helen's from the Laborites. This borough, with the exception of its election, had been Unionist since 1866. The Liberals gained Southwark West, Burnley and Coventry, and the Laborites gained Woolwich and Whitehaven, all from the Unionists; while this morning's return at Sunderland showed that the Liberal candidate Greenwood and Laborite Goldstone had replaced two Unionists. The turning of the tide towards Liberalism is a surprise for Unionists, who counted upon capturing half a dozen seats from the enemy. The greatest surprise was in Coventry, because that is the seat of motor manufacturing. The Liberals hardly expected to win Burnley because the Socialist Hyndman was in the field and hoped to take part of the Labor votes. The Southwark contest was one of the most interesting. E. A. Strauss, Liberal, winning by only 12 votes. In Woolwich, Will Crooks, who was turned out in the last election, recaptured his old seat by a majority of 2%. The Unionists distributed their heavy guns at Battersea; but John Burns, President of the Local Government Board again surprised them, bringing up his majority from 555 in the last election to 1292. The Socialist, Shaw, whom Mr. Burns' enemies among the workmen put up in the expectation that he would divide the votes, polled only a handful. John Burns dashed around the constituency in a dog, in an automobile. Sir John Harrington, the Unionist candidate, with his wife followed suit in another. Mr. Burns replied to his friends, "Don't listen to the fine ladies who visit the mean streets only when they want something." Almost everywhere fewer ballots were cast than in the last election. More Liberals than Unionists stayed away from the polls, excluding the districts which changed 18 of the Liberals in 12. The Conservative candidates in London did poorly, none commanding 500 majority, an impressive lesson of the campaign of how strongly British voters are wedded to their parties, how slow they are to break away though the parties change their platforms radically. The newspapers appear exercised over their surprising small influence. Almost all the most important among them and those with the largest circulation championed the Unionist cause, yet they were unable to make material inroads against Liberals and Laborites. The betting on the Stock Exchange before elections was that the coalition majority would drop 65. As the elections progressed the "long" favored 80, then 90, now it concedes that the Government will have 100 majority.

Supreme Court.

Before Mr. Justice Emerson and Mr. Justice Johnson.

The King vs. Caroline Wells.
After Mr. Browning had read the indictment, the prisoner pleaded guilty, and then made a statement confessing that she had intentionally burnt the house which was insured, but that she did not intend to apply for the insurance money.

Mr. Justice Johnson criticized adversely the admission of a confession of guilt to an indictment framed in old-fashioned terms, which a prisoner evidently did not understand.

Mr. Justice Emerson observed that the prisoner had confessed to burning her house which was insured, and that the law infers under such circumstances that she did it to defraud the insurance company.

Mr. Justice Emerson then sentenced the prisoner to two years, hard labour.

Mr. Justice Johnson concurred with the sentence and the term of punishment, as the law considers that a person who willfully burns an insured house, does it to defraud the insurance company and the court had admitted these facts in her own statement. But he protested against a prisoner's admission of guilt on a arraignment, in answer to an indictment, which an ignorant prisoner does not understand. He would make his protest good in a proper case.

The King vs. Herbert H. Thoms.
On arraignment in answer to the indictment for bigamy, the prisoner pleaded guilty and said he had nothing to say as to the sentence. He was sentenced to two years hard labour, from December 3rd.

The King vs. John R. Dunlop.
On arraignment in answer to the indictment charging him with shooting with intent to murder, etc., the prisoner pleaded not guilty. Mr. W. R. Howley said he appeared for the accused. The Minister of Justice moved that Tuesday be set down for trial, and asked for an extra panel of jurors. Mr. Howley consented. The court ordered it accordingly.
