There was not a day we did not pass two or three bodies of men women and children lying on the road. When people got tired and gave up, they simply dropped down where they were and died. They did no even go to raised track on side but dropped in roads where they lay unburied. These were some of the ob servations of Jameson, Red Cross Engineer, sent to inspect the famine district in China and to report on the possibility of flood prevention in Hwai These appalling conditions apply to three million people. Unless outside relief is instantly forthcoming he declared, untold thousands of these must die before the scanty new crops are ripened and gathered.
