LONDON, Feb. 19. Austen Chamberlain sending ten guineas to the Lord Mayor's Fund for the erection of a memorial to Capt. Scott and his companions expresses the hope that the memorial will include a monument in St. Paul's Cathedral. He suggests, as a subject of consideration, whether the design and execution of the work itself might not be entrusted to Mrs. Scott, the widow of the intrepid explorer. She is a sculptor of distinction, and was formerly Miss Kathleen Bruce, daughter of Canon Lloyd Bruce. She was known as an artist before her marriage five years ago, and studied under Rodin, exhibiting at the Royal Academy and the Paris Salon. Last year she held an exhibition of her work at the Grafton Galleries. Mrs. Scott designed the memorial statue of C. S. Rolls, the aviator, which stands on the Dover sea-front. She also designed the Gold Commemorative Medal presented to Admiral Peary by the Royal Geographical Society after his reported discovery of the North Pole.

LONDON, Feb. 19. The Board of the Imperial Tobacco Company, of Britain and Ireland has contributed 1,000 guineas to the assistance of the dependants of the Antarctic victims. J. M. Barrie, who was godfather to Scott's son, Peter, sends the following letter to the newspaper:—"As a friend of Scott, may I ask what is in my mind of many others, that, despite the fine help of the press, things are not going on too well with the various schemes started to do honor to the men who have done much to honor us. Almost every Briton is proud these last few days because the message from the tent has shown him how the breed lives on. But it seems almost time to remind him of that most practical Englishman who said of a friend in need, 'I am sorry for him £5.' How much are you sorry?" Writing of the liabilities of the Scott expedition he says that the correct sum including everything is £12,000. What people are waiting for, he adds, is the Government's definite statement; every day there is delay making this and other funds suffer.

LONDON, Feb. 19. Lloyd George's new residence, under erection at Walton Heath, was partially wrecked by an explosion this morning, supposed to be another suffragette outrage. Two broken hats were found in the wreckage. Neighbors declare an automobile passed through a nearby village in the early hours. Nobody was injured.

MEXICO CITY, Feb. 19. General Huerta, who had been commanding Mexico's troops, has been proclaimed Provisional Governor-General of the Mexican Republic. General Betanuel, who aided in Ma-

dero's overthrow, has been appointed Provisional Military Commander. This is with the approval of General Felix Diaz. The ten days' battle appears to be now over, and the populace appears satisfied, men, women, and children thronging the square in front of the National Palace and cheerfully shouting "Viva" for the three principals and Manuel Mondragon, who conducted the military operations for General Diaz.

LONDON, Feb. 19. Within the last week underwriters have doubled the premiums on War risks. They are now twenty guineas per cent. for three months, and cover war between Austria and Russia; and include 3 per cent. of the property of the Galician Oil Fields, which may be damaged during hostilities there.

BERLIN, Feb. 19. The official minister of the Reichstag show that the assumption from Von Tirpitz's speech that England and Germany had reached some sort of naval reduction agreement, was unwarranted. No agreement has been reached, and no negotiations are in progress. The ministers show that the Admiral's statement was merely a recognition of the facts, coupled with an intimation that Germany does not contemplate any important increase in battleships.

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 19. The completion here of the purchase of the Karluk, 320 tons, steam whaler, indicates that Stefansson is arranging a second expedition under German auspices, to start May 1st, to explore the Arctic circle north of Banks Land. About twenty scientists will accompany him on a three years' voyage.

LONDON, Feb. 19. A despatch from Constantinople to the Daily News, says that an anti-government plot has been discovered and that the doors of the Porte have been closed since last Sunday. The officers of the late Nazim Pasha have fled, and fourteen others have been degraded. Several high officers have been summoned before a court martial. A new National guard is being formed under Young Turk officers.

LONDON, Feb. 19. Sir George Frampton, R.A., has undertaken the work of designing a bronze medal in memory of the late William T. Stread, who perished in the Titanic. It will be placed on the Thames Embankment, and a replica sent to New York for erection there.

CHRISTCHURCH, N.Z., Feb. 19. The whaler Narvoga, which arrived here yesterday, brings nearly half a ton of ambergris, which is believed to break all records. Its value is \$400,000.

Steamer Labrador Getting Ready.

The sealing steamer Labrador, which will prosecute the Gulf seal fishery in charge of Captain Martin, moved over from the Southside yesterday and berthed at Baird's premises to be outfitted for the voyage. In the channel made by the steamer a number of boys were watched from the pier copying on pans of ice and apparently enjoying themselves; some of the lads got duckings and eye-witnesses were frightened. Just a Hero.

His gray hairs distinguished him among London's taxi drivers—chauffeurs are usually young men. Aside from his years, he attracted no special attention. An observant "face" might have noticed the stern lines and the fine courage of his face. But it was the hand of Death that disclosed his identity.

On Friday, January 10th, he set forth on his last ride, the one remaining survivor of his regiment behind him and the belated honor of a nation glorifying his name. The cross of valor was pinned upon his faded tunic—the insignia of ultimate courage, the mightiest distinction that crowns the soldier's career.

Time was when a British army faced a horde of maddened blacks—a handful of men in the heart of the wilds, outnumbered, isolated, weary—the safety of the regiment in the eyes and ears and the heart of a single serf.

A woolly head lifts craftily from the grasses, another follows. A shot splits the night. The savages are disclosed, but first, a rain of assegais finds a target.

The watcher drops. The bugle blares. The troops are on the ramparts, and again the flag that knows a' winds flutters in victory, but not before a fresh star is added to the glory of British arms.

An officer drops across a quivering body—the stricken sentinel lifts himself. Blind with agony and spurring blood from a dozen wounds he raises his commander in his arms and totters with him into the zone of safety.

Months in a camp hospital follow—then honourable discharge and home—mere heroism does not win shoulder straps.

The intervening years are cloaked in obscurity. Who can tell in what manner he eeked out an existence? Perhaps a porter in a city office, maybe a hotel commissionaire, obsequiously grateful for sixpence tips. Or such is the breed of valor.

Two Men Drowned.

Deputy Minister of Customs, Le Messurier, received a message from Mr. G. C. Hann, of Lunenburg, last evening, stating in effect that two young men, Peter Haley and Patrick Fleming, belonging to Allan's Island, were drowned while crossing from the mainland to the island on Sunday night, the 16th inst. Both bodies have been recovered. The message flashed by saying that the dory the victims were in, evidently caught in the ice and capsized. The first intimation anyone had of the tragedy was when they saw the dory drifting seaward at noon on the 18th.

Solomon's Temple.

The Freemasons of the world propose to re-build the Temple of Solomon at Jerusalem, re-creating on the ashes of the dead past the ancient glories of the famous Temple. This stupendous undertaking to reproduce the stateliness and splendour of the original edifice will involve an outlay of some hundreds of thousands of pounds. The site fixed on is now occupied by a Mahomedan mosque called the Dome of the Rock. This is believed to be the original site of the great King's Temple. According to the Bible, the building of the Temple employed 70,000 men who carried burdens, 80,000 hevers of stone, and 3,000 overseers. In preparing the materials three years were taken, and seven more in actual construction. The Temple was so famous for its decorations that we wonder whether if the scheme matures, it is the intention of the promoters to reproduce all the beauties. Take the gold alone.
