Early Messages.

AMERICAN FORCES REPULSE AT TACK.
Headquarters of the American Troops, France, March 6.—Still another place on the French front has been raided by the Germans who were repulsed with losses. This was the first time permission has been given to mention this engagement. The American forces entered the battle line in a certain place in Lorraine. The French commander congratulated the Americans on their behaviour. The French official statement of March 5, which said that a German attack on the trenches held by the American forces in Lorraine on the night of March 4, was repulsed.

WANTS NO RUSSIAN TERRITORY.
OLODIA, Russia, Mar. 6.
David R. Francis, American Ambassador, to-day published a statement declaring that the United States didn't desire a territory conquest in Russia. He said he already had recommended to his Government that it recognizes any Government the Russian people might choose. He sincerely hoped that the Russian people would refuse to ratify a separate peace treaty with the Central Powers.

AMERICAN TROOPS HOLDING TRENCHES.
WASHINGTON, March 6.
American troops are now holding something over eight miles of trenches on the battlefield in France, it was learned to-day, although in an air line their frontage is only about four and a half miles. This frontage is liable to extension at any time. The trench lines are responsible for their eight miles of length. They are laid out so that flanking fire may be obtained along every part of the front. Strong points containing machine guns are put out for this purpose, and follow closely any protective slope of country and wander up and down hill.

BODY SENT HOME.—The remains of the late James H. Baggs, who was one of the victims of the Florizel disaster, was forwarded by to-day's express to Curling, accompanied by his brother-in-law Mr. Job Roberts. The funeral at the station took place at 11 o'clock this morning from the residence of Dr. Roberts, 170 New Gower Street.

LLEWELLYN CLUB.—His Excellency Sir Alexander Harris intends visiting the Llewellyn Club at Canon Wood Hall this evening. In the recent disaster four of its members, viz., J. S. Munn, G. A. Moulton, Jr., Wm. Moore and Jas. Miller lost their lives and at to-night's meeting special tributes will be paid to their memory.
