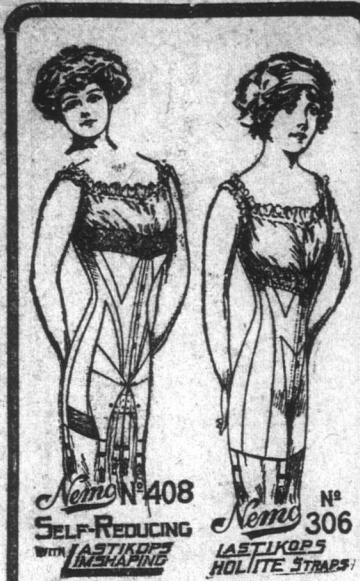

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Exquisite Robes Out of Their Paris Wrappings Are Brilliant With Rhinestones

Every woman may feel that she has a chance to shine this season. With sparkling robes and glittering faces her appearance will make the most commonplace of her last year's costumes seem dim and dull. Beads and rhinestones outline the designs on handsome robes, work out the patterns in real lace and decorate most of the corages of gowns of simpler tone.

Some of the new trimmings just imported by a firm who brings Paris to us through their buyer, are worthy a place in a cabinet along with other objects of art. First of these are, of course, the real lace, duchesse wide enough for a full length skirt, Valenciennes with a design of roses having the flowers delicately padded and outlined with thinnest rhinestones, or run with threads of a delicate color.

Bohemian the New Lace.

Specially favored among all the lace brought over for the trimming of ceremonious gowns is the Bohemian, a wonderfully intricate webby looking lace which, like Venice, meets a demand for a lace between the very heavy and the very filmy patterns. The workmanship on it is exquisite, and in durability it probably has few equals. Wide bandings and deeply scalloped flouncings will be used on gowns and bits of it will be worked up here and there on blouses.

Among the most fascinating robes which this buyer has brought over are those of white chiffon embroidered heavily in white silk with tulle of velvet. Some of this work may be had in all-over as well as the bands and flounces. One place of chiffon robes is of white with a border of "longues of flame" outlined with jet "flame" is the newest and most ruggedly popular color just now in Paris. Another handsome chiffon robe has a border of gold stripes running up from the edge about twelve inches, each stripe spangled with gold and finished on the edge with gold beads and bugles.

A handsome black robe of chiffon was embroidered in silk flowers with velvet petals applied. A yard of this employed on a handsome gown about the corage and sleeves would add a distinctive elegant touch.

A Young Girl's Dress.

Daintiness itself is embodied in a charming net lace frock, completely made excepting for the slip. The skirt was plaited (more fluting than actual plaiting). The waist part was plaited, the shoulders and sleeves in one with the skirt, smooth and simple. The bottom had an edge of corset tulle, a glimpse of the same was finished with girlish bow and a tiny tail collar also of the tulle completed this youthful little dancing frock.

Robes of handsome Chantilly and Lierre lace, collars, flounces and scarves to use as trimmings are among the early importations at this place. The most lovely old wash blond with sheer spaced stripes of color outlined with diminutive rhinestones is shown by the yard five inches wide. It is to be used in the flattest of little plaits in dress frocks. The little trimming and other flouncings worked out in colors and red beads are reminiscent of grandmother and her best bib and tucker, so delightfully old fashioned are they.

Everyone they went the greatest courtesy was shown toward them, and the citizens of Calgary responded most generously.

Three prizes were awarded by the society to the women who collected the largest amounts. The first (ten dollars) was won by Miss Turner of Crescent Heights, who collected \$18.10.

The second (five dollars) was awarded to Mrs. W. I. Gibbs of Elbow Park. She collected \$15.10.

The third (three dollars and a half) was won by Miss Grace Ford, who collected \$2.50.

U. and the members of the various Sunday schools, also the Royal Crown Soap company, which donated 7,500 tags; Superintendent McCauley and the city for street car privileges, and the newspapers for their free advertising.
