The Board of Education for the London District met at the School House in London, on the 15th January, 1841, when the following orders were made:

Ordered by the Board, that from and after the first day of July next, in order to introduce a uniform system of Education in this District, Teachers will be required to introduce into their respective Schools, Lennie's Child's A. B. C., Lennie's Child's Ladder, Chamber's Moral Class Book, Stewart's Geography, & Lennie's English Grammar. And in order that these Books may be furnished as cheaply as possible, the Board have ordered from Edinburgh, a supply of them which will be sold at cost to Teachers and Parents of Children. The use however of the Moral Class Book will not be insisted upon, although it is hoped that it will be voluntarily introduced.

It is further ordered, that from and after the first day of June next, no broken period will be allowed to any Teacher; that the year must commence on the first day of June; but a period of six or nine Months will be allowed, provided it expires on or before the 31st day of May in any year.

It is further ordered, that all reports for the year, or six or nine Months thereof, shall be delivered to the Clerk of the Board, on or before the 15th day of June in each year, after which a distribution will immediately be made, and no report will be received after that time.

It is further ordered, that quarterly reports be made of the respective Schools—it will not however be required that these reports be sent in oftener than twice in the year, so that two of these reports can be sent in at the same time.

It is further ordered, that no report will be received from any Teacher who has not been examined touching his or her qualifications before the Board or some one of its Members; but in order to prevent inconvenience to Teachers, any of the members of the Board will examine them at their respective places of residence. No Teacher will hereafter be entitled to a Certificate who cannot Teach English Reading, Writing, Common Arithmetic, English Grammar and Geography, except Female Teachers; and no Teacher who is reported & proved to the Board to be of intemperate habits will in any case receive Government compensation.

It is further ordered, that in addition to the usual certificate now required, to be signed by the Trustees, a clause shall be inserted in the certificate that the Trustees have personally examined the School once at least during the period stated in the Certificate; and that every quarterly Report have attached to it the Rules & Regulations of the School; and every Trustee must be able to sign his own name.

It is further ordered, that the Clerk of the Board procure the above orders to be printed twice in both the newspapers published in London, and also printed in the form of circulars & sent to every Teacher in the District.
