Halifax, N.S., Oct. 1—About 10 o'clock
to-night fire started in the planing mill
on Taylor's wharf in the center of a
densely built wooden district on the
waterfront. At midnight it is raging
with unabated fury, having burnt north
through Buller, Brookfield, Liveroool,
Dewolf and Hamilton wharves. Davison
Bros.' and Humphrey's is now burning.
The Cunard big docks come next; and it is
feared they cannot be saved. The fire is
also burning south, having burned over
Taylor's and Cronan's immense wharves,
and the buildings are now burning. All
the fire engines in the city and Dartmouth
are at the scene. The fire is the most
disastrous which has occurred in this city
for many years. Large stores of oil are
burning, mostly of the Standard Oil Company and Eastern Oil Company. The loss
will probably be from \$250,000 to \$500,000.
So far no loss of life is reported.
