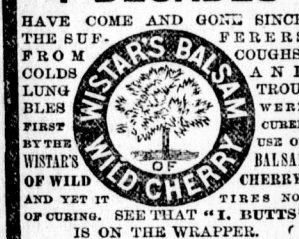

Henry Eggleston and his wife appeared

before the Squire Lacey yesterday afternoon

say anything, and the Magistrate dis-
