FLOOD, FIRE AND FAMINE. Northern China Visited by Dire Disaster.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Feb. 6.—Details have been received of the terrible floods and famine which have prevailed recently in the interior districts of Northern China. The people of Schuan have suffered terribly by floods, which destroyed temples, bridges and dwellings in the ten districts.

In Wen-Chuan the loss of life will reach fully 1,000. Immediately following the floods at Pie Chang a fire broke out and destroyed 35 houses. In three other places houses were burned to the number of 200. The suffering among the poor is something terrible. The roads are difficult of passage, and crowds of starving wretches are on their way to Shanghai, and how to deal with them will be a difficult problem for those in power to solve. Corn and millet are selling at the fairs along the great road to Paolta and San-Si at double the price of one year ago. Kaoling stalks for incle cannot be had at any price, and for building purposes they bring 4 cents per stalk.
