FAIR TO CLOUDY—SHOWERS IN
SOME PLACES.

Toronto, April 29-31 p.m.—The pres-
sure remains comparatively low in the
western and northwestern portions of
the continent, but it has increased a
good deal over Lake Superior. Rain
has fallen over Alberta and in the Lake
Superior district. Elsewhere the weather
has been fair.

Minimum and maximum temperatures:
Calgary, 42-58; Qu'Appelle, 36-68; Win-
nipeg, 34-68; Parry Sound, 42-72; Toron-
to, 41-68; Montreal, 42-68; Quebec, 44-68;
Halifax, 30-56.

Toronto, April 30-1 a.m.—The prob-
abilities for the next 24 hours for the
lower lake region (covering the penin-
sula and as far east as Belleville) are:
Northeasterly to easterly winds; fair
to cloudy; showers in some places; sta-
tionary or a little lower temperature.

REMOVAL OF THE STOMACH IN

SURGERY.

The possibilities of modern aseptic
surgery seem well nigh boundless. It
stops at nothing, even daring to remove
the greater part of important organs
whose preservation intact has generally
been regarded as necessary to life.

Thus, large portions of organs like the
brain, liver and lungs, and the entire
kidney and spleen, have been removed.

A recent case, in which nearly the
whole stomach was removed, to get rid
of a malignant growth, is reported in
the Medical News, Philadelphia.

The News: "The newly-formed stom-
ach had a capacity corresponding to the
volume of a hen's egg."

Mr. John Lackie, who died at his home

on Kensington street, London West, on

Friday, was born in Drummondville, in

Quebec Province, his parents having

originally settled there after leaving Ire-
land. After the death of his father, he be-
came the youngest son, took charge of the
estate near Drummondville. He married
Miss M. A. French, of Drummondville.

She and a family of four sons and four
daughters survive him. Two of the daugh-
