THE DREADFUL DROUGHT.

Wells Running Dry and Forests De-
stroyed by Fire.

WINDSOR, Aug. 28.—The present drought
in Essex county surpasses the memory of
even the "coldest inhabitant." Farmers
are drawing water for miles, and this
morning at McGregor, a little station at
the junction of the M. C. R. and Lake
Erie and Detroit River Railroad, twelve
miles from here, women begged water from
the locomotive tanks.

For several days forest fires have been
raging in the wood lands in Essex county,
and in sections visited by fire the farmers
have been burning the fire to the
woods. On the Walker farm the bush has
been burning nearly three weeks. The
damage created by these fires is serious.

GRAND RAPIDS, Wis., Aug. 28.—Vesper,
a lumbering village in Wood county, was
lipped out by forest fires this afternoon.
Loss, \$75,000.

Sudden Death at Hamilton.

HAMILTON, Aug. 28.—Death came with
awful suddenness to the home of Mr.
Edward Gale, Robert street, this morning.
When Mr. Gale awoke at about 7 o'clock
he found his wife lying beside him, evidently
in great pain. She was unable to speak,
and Mr. Gale was speedily on his way for a
doctor. When he returned in a few
minutes his wife was dead. Deceased had
been troubled for some time with heart
disease, but appeared well when she
retired last night. She was 26 years of age,
and leaves two children, the younger a
babe in arms.

St. Clair and Erie Canal.

It is expected that Col. Tisdale, M.P.,
will be here next week to interview the
municipal council as to the diverting of the
concession roads in view of the canal being
proceeded with. In addition to four railway
bridges, the company would probably con-
sent to erect, maintain and operate three
road bridges—one possibly at "the jog,"
and one in each of the two municipalities as
the council may designate—which would
be sufficient for all traffic, as the company
proposes to construct for the use of the
public, a good gravel road along the
entire length and on each side of the canal
and leading to the bridges. This, instead
of being a detriment, would be an improve-
ment over the present roads during the
greater portion of the year. The company
says that it would be folly to proceed with
the work unless such an arrangement is
made, which, if done, will be immediately
followed by the posting up of the \$50,000
deposit. Otherwise the whole work falls
to the ground. There is no doubt but that
the council interested will deal liberally
with Col. Tisdale, and the more promptly
they do so the quicker will work be started.

Sowing the Seed

reached the treasury. Sir Richard named
rice as an illustration. They were paying
1 1/2 cents a pound on cleaned rice and allow-
ing unhulled rice to enter at a nominal
duty. Naturally the people who cleaned
the rice put up the price to the highest
point. The result was this: That while
the public paid only \$50,000 a year in
taxes to the treasury, they were entitled
to the extent of about \$300,000. Mr.
Foster saw this, and proposed to raise the
duty on unhulled rice, which, he said,
would yield considerable revenue. He meant
to do it. But the rice manufacturers
took him by the throat and compelled him
to go back to the old exorbitant rates which
enable them to tax consumers some \$274,000
a year. (Hear, hear.) For every dollar
on rice the buyers paid \$5 to the maker.
On the great staple of sugar the people
were taxed \$2,000,000 a year, not a copper
of which found its way to the treasury.
Under this so-called tariff reform measure
there were articles which were taxed 40,
50, 60, or even 100 per cent. This applied
to the whole iron list and chiefly articles
employed by the farmers. Take wall
paper. On the cheaper grades used by the
poor man the duty was 100 per cent,
while on the expensive article it was hardly
30 per cent. The richer the man, the
less revenue he paid. This was an essential
ingredient of specific taxation and remained
a part of our tariff today.

As high as nineteen twentieths of the
Canadian manufacturers, Sir Richard
affirmed, could derive no advantage what-
ever from a protective tariff, and all this
monstrous burden was practically imposed
upon the people for the benefit of an ex-
ceedingly small number of men who were
allowed by the Government to tax the
whole community for their own benefit and
who resented the favor by contributing
to the party exchequer. (Cheers.)

"I have always been opposed to a protective
tariff," said the speaker, "chiefly be-
cause of its moral mischief. I have
studied the workings in Canada and the
States, and have read much of them in
other countries, and I tell you the pro-
tective tariff is opposed to all ideas of a
free spirit. (Cheers.) Protection is death
to representative government, which is
always open to the evil of corruption.
You will do well to take a lesson from the
United States at this moment. There you
have a great people determined to do
away with the protective system. Yet so
strongly is the evil entrenched that you
have 65,000,000 people baffled by three or
four senators who are known to be the
paid agents of a trust. Sir Richard
warned his hearers that though such
impediment would be in the way here,
there would be a harder battle to fight
than that of Cobden and Bright in over-
throwing only agricultural protection. Of
all countries on this continent at least,
Canada was the worst suited to protection
and the least warranted in hamper-
ing its great natural resources to
construct a small number of industries.
The Liberal party held the highest con-
ception of Canada's possibilities. They
were not afraid to match Canadian labor,
skill and intelligence against those
qualities in any other people of the world.
(Cheers.) The present conditions of Can-
ada, he said, had the essence of slavery.
Protection had compared to the truck
system, under which a man was not al-
lowed to use his wages as he pleased. He
was glad to see the hopeful signs of
awakening throughout all the land. In
conclusion Sir Richard appealed to the
Elgins to join with them and all men who
desired pure government to put a stop to
the iniquities under which they had so long
suffered. (Loud cheers.)

Hon. G. W. Ross, introduced as a
man against whom the fiercest fight was
waged in the late battle. The honorable
gentleman was in a happy vein and carried
the audience with him. He announced
that he would not make a speech, but would
only thank the electors of Elgin for the
manly fight they made in the last Ontario
election. "We are greatly indebted to the
electors of West Elgin for their successful
fight. I am told the choice would have
been an admirable one." (Cries of "You're
right.") I understand he is a Highland
Scotchman. That sometimes helps a man
a little. I have had to depend upon it for
some of my character in days gone by.
(Laughter.) In East Elgin you were not
so successful, but you cast your bread
upon the waters and I hope at the next
election "you will get it back." (Laughter.)
Mr. Ross remarked that in East Middlesex,
where they pulled for the Shore, they had
a Tory no longer, and he hoped the Patron
elected would be true to the principles of
his order. The speaker thanked the
sensible Conservatives for their support,
for many of them had seen virtues in a
Liberal at last.

"The last election was a very peculiar
one," said Mr. Ross. "There were 200
candidates in the field. We contested 79
seats and carried 46 of them. Mr. Mer-
edith had the courage to contest 50, and
only carried 29 of them. The independent
party, including the Patrons, the P. P. A.
and others whose politics were not clearly
defined, contested 69 and carried 19.
Some say the present Government cannot
carry on the affairs of the Province.
If we cannot, who can? (Cheers.) Mr.
Meredith with only 29 at his back? The
Patrons with 19? The P. P. A. with two
certainly could not! (Laughter.) Well,
why cannot we? (Cheers.) The election,
continued Mr. Ross, was a very peculiar
one from the number of candidates on the
field, and those who remained on the field
after the battle was over. It was no com-
mon slaughter. He never knew of a cam-
paign in which the Conservatives seemed
to be so opposed to fighting. There were
only 34 constituencies in the Province in
which the Liberals could get face to face
with them. Of this 34 the Liberals carried
20 and the Conservatives 14. "If we had
a straight fight in all the ridings we
would have, on this ratio, 60
out of 94 seats." (Cheers.) Their
opponents never met them upon their
financial position squarely or the
enemy would have been routed horse, foot
and artillery. "Fancy \$70,000,000 spent
in 22 years, and not one dollar which they
can point at as being corruptly spent," de-
clared Mr. Ross amid cheers. "and then
compare that with the record of corruption
Sir Richard Cartwright has revealed.
Then look at the surplus of \$6,000,000
piled up for Ontario while in the Dominion
Government there is a debt of \$240,000,000."
(Cheers.)

Mr. Ross said they had to contend
with a sectarian cry, the most malicious
and foundationless ever launched in Ont-
ario. It was said they had managed the
public and high schools in religious
classes, but every charge by Protest-
ant ministers. It had also been shown
that all amendments to the Separate
School Act, which, it was charged, were
due to Roman Catholic interference, had
been approved by the Opposition. They
had been accused of appointing Catholics
to public offices out of all pro-

portion and returns also proved the charge
to be false. He would like Mr. Meredith
to show where he got his credentials as a
Protestant champion. From the past his-
tory of his party or facts for I
Electors? (Laughter.) He hoped this base
cry would be stamped out by every elector.
Protestantism, which had made the em-
pire great, did not need such protection.
(Cheers.) The Government did not fear
the closest investigation, but when atten-
tion was diverted by these sectarian cries,
it was no wonder that some constituencies
changed their political representation. The
Liberal party had nothing to fear from any
progressive element along truly Liberal
lines. In concluding, Mr. Ross was glad
to express sympathy with the spirit of
the other speeches. The sooner they
returned to the broad
principles which had made England
great, the sooner they recognized that they
were entitled to trade with the whole
world if need be, and the sooner they
brought together all the colonies, the
British empire, he said, and the impor-
tant relations, the more fully would they
bring prosperity in time to come. (Cheers.)

Donald Macnisch, M. P. P.
The newly elected and popular member
for West Elgin was given an ovation. He
congratulated the promoters of the grand
demonstration. He took this opportunity
of thanking the Liberals of West Elgin
for the honor conferred upon him and the
great victory on June 28. (Cheers.) To
the young Liberals belonged much of the
honor, and it was a hopeful sign of the
victory that awaited them in the next con-
test. He hoped that both candidates in
the Elgins would receive the same generous
support as he was accorded. Mr. Macnisch
said he would do his best to deserve the
confidence reposed in him.

Dr. Wilson, ex-M. P. of East Elgin was
the last speaker. He paid a high and com-
plimentary to Sir Richard Cartwright, than
whom there was no more able man upon the
finances of the country. Were they to
adopt principles laid down by the
mother country or those
established by the United States? It was
their bounden duty, said Dr. Wilson, to
prepare for the Dominion struggle, that
they might be as successful as Mr. Macnisch
was. (Cheers.)

VOTES OF THANKS.
The chairman's announcement that the
executive had decided to hold an Elgin
Liberal picnic every year was approved by
the big audience. Then votes of thanks
were passed to the chairman and speakers
in recognition of George Casey, M. P., and
cheers were given for the Queen and Mr.
Laurier.

The immense gathering on the heights,
after the speaking, did not disperse until
dark, and made the evening merry. Sir
Richard Cartwright, Mr. Ross and others
left for St. Thomas after supper.

POLITICAL RUMOR
That Parliament Will Meet in December,
Followed by General Election
in March.

OTTAWA, Aug. 28.—The latest political
rumor here is that Parliament will meet
early in December, and that the general
election will come off in March next.

Death of Ex-Registrar McDougall at

a strong supporter and platform speaker of
the Reform party.

Tuberculosis Among Nova Scotia
Cattle.

OTTAWA, Aug. 28.—Prof. Saunders has
returned from the Maritime Provinces.
He visited the Experimental Farm for the
Maritime Provinces at Nappan, N. S., and
made a careful and thorough test of the
cattle on the farm with tuberculosis to
decide whether tuberculosis existed in the
herd. Thirty-nine animals were tested,
and ten of these showed the reaction, indi-
cating the presence of the disease. The
disease was found in each, but in most
instances it was in the earlier stages. The
animals destroyed consisted of five thor-
oughbreds and five grades. One of the
thoroughbreds was sent from Western
Ontario, the other animals were raised in
different parts of Nova Scotia.

Three Paramount Societies.

KINGSTON, Ont., Aug. 28.—The Rev. Dr.
Carman preached twice in Brock Street
Methodist Church Sunday. Two things he
said caused much talk. He pointed out
that God had placed man in three great
societies, the Church, the Family, and the
State. Said the speaker: "Show me a man
and I will show you that these three soci-
eties, and I will show you that these soci-
eties do not need to join an Orange lodge or
the P. P. A., or any kind of A. B. C. society
organized by men." Again, he remarked,
if he ran an election he would rather have
the true and faithful people of the Church
of God on his side than the rummies and
rowdies of the community, but it would be
wrong for him to join a church solely for
the motive of being elected.
