Sheet—Unsubscribed Capital Stock to be
Disposed Of—A Branch to be Opened in
Vancouver—Officers for the ensuing Year.The twentieth annual general meet-
ing of the Imperial Bank of Canada was
held, in pursuance of the terms of the
charter, at the banking house of the
institution, 19th of June, 1895.The following shareholders were present

rectors and the Statement of Affairs.

THE REPORT.

The Directors have much pleasure in
meeting the shareholders, and beg to
submit the Twentieth Annual Balance
Sheet and Statement of Profits for the
year ended 31st of May, 1895.Out of the net profits of the year, after
making full provision for all bad
and doubtful debts, maintaining the
fund to cover rebate on unmatured dis-
counted bills, and after laying aside
the annual contribution to the Officers'
and Employees' Guarantee Fund (au-
thorized under by-law 15),(A) Two half-yearly dividends at the
rate of eight per cent. per annum and
a bonus of one per cent. for the second
half-year have been paid.(B) Bank premises account has been
credited with \$25,000.The profits of the Bank for the past
year have suffered somewhat from a
long spell of easy money and from a
general dullness in trade accompanied
by low prices for almost all commercial
products, particularly for those of the
soil; it is gratifying to know that an
improvement has set in both in trade
and in prices. The Bank, as is evi-
dent from the submitted statement of
its affairs, is in an excellent position to
avail itself of any further revival in
business.Your Directors would recommend that
the unsubscribed capital stock of the
Bank, amounting to 364 shares, be dis-
posed of at an early date, and in accor-
dance with the provisions of the Bank
Act.Premises have been secured in Van-
couver, and a branch of the Bank will
be opened in that city in the course
of two or three months.All of which is respectfully sub-
