### TALK OF PEACE

Early Settlement of the Steel Strike Anticipated.

Youngstown, Ohio, Sept. 12.—President W. E. Cuddy, of the American Steel Hoop Company, arrived in Youngstown yesterday afternoon with other officials of the company. They will hold a conference today with the amalgamated men regarding a settlement of the strike.

Cleveland, Ohio, Sept. 12.—The "Iron Trade Review" this week says: "Indications now point to an early settlement of the steel strike. According to Pittsburgh advices, President Shaffer has been instructed by the executive committee of the Amalgamated Association to negotiate for peace on the best terms obtainable, and it is probable that the strike will be settled on the terms offered by the United States Steel Company last week."

### SHUT THEM OUT (?)

San Francisco, Sept. 12.—Representative Metcalf, of the third California district, proposes to introduce a strong immigration restriction measure at the next session of congress. He says: "No anarchist should be allowed to enter."

## CAUGHT BY CRABBE!

Sharp Engagement Between British and Boers at Dreifontein—37 Boers Captured.

London, Sept. 11.—A dispatch from Cape Town says Col. Crabbe engaged the Boers at Dreifontein yesterday. Commandant Van der Merwe and another burgher were killed, several were wounded and 37 were captured. The British casualties were four killed and three wounded.

Commandant Van der Merwe was driven out of Steytlerville, Cape Colony, about 120 miles from Port Elizabeth, two weeks ago.

The Dordrecht volunteers surprised a party of Boers near a farmhouse and ordered them to surrender. The Boers refused and the British opened fire, wounding Gen. Smuts and another Boer, and killing Capt. Arben-dorff. Gen. Smuts succeeded in making his escape.

The Riverside district of Cape Colony has been entirely cleared of the invaders.

BRITISH AMBUSHED IN A PASS. Cape Town, Sept. 11.—While Col. Munro's column was returning from Barkly West to Dordrecht it was attacked by the Boers under Commandants Fouché and Myburg in the Wolves Kloof. The advance guard was still in the pass when a terrific fire was opened upon them from the heights above the Kloof. The British were in a precarious position on the flat, where there was little or no cover, but they rapidly unlimbered and returned a brisk fire. The fighting continued for some time. The British had four wounded and a considerable number of Boers killed and a considerable number of Boers captured.

On the following morning a reconnoitering force, with big guns, cleared Wolves Kloof of the Boers, who retreated in the direction of the Drakensberg. The British followed the burghers for a considerable distance, shelling them incessantly.

Such Turkish reports have previously been fore-runners of massacres of Armenians, and it is generally apprehended by non-Muslims that the massacres have already taken place.

WOULD COLONIZE CRIMINALS. Amsterdam, Sept. 12.—The session of the Congress of Criminal Anthropology, held in this city, Clark, Bell, New York City, and Henry Havelock Ellis, of England, were appointed vice-presidents. Prof. Cesare Lombroso, the celebrated Italian alienist, read a paper entitled "Criminal Degeneracy." In the course of which he discussed the living together of criminals as a remedy for crime, insisting that it would tend to lead the criminals into useful ways. He urged upon governments the duty of working in this direction.

GLASGOW PEACE CONFERENCE. Glasgow, Sept. 12.—The universal peace conference opened a today's session here. Dr. Trueblood, an American delegate, said the peace sentiment in America was the strongest since 1818. The Federal Government was absolutely committed to The Hague Peace Conference. The friends of peace were now endeavoring to induce the American republics to draft a mutual peace arbitration treaty pledging themselves to refer all disputes to The Hague. There was a goodly number of delegates from the States which were not represented at The Hague.

THE ROPE BROKE. London, Sept. 12.—While workmen were placing the six-ton millennial statue of King Alfred upon its pedestal at Winchester a rope broke when the statue had been hoisted a few feet. It is believed that it was not much damaged by the fall.

MINE DISASTER. London, Sept. 12.—An explosion of dynamite occurred in the Llanbadrach mine at Caerphilly, Glamorganshire, Wales. Over 40 were in the mine at the time. Thirteen miners were rescued unhurt. Eight were taken out severely injured, and two were killed. It is believed that 12 are still in the pit.

A MERCHANT'S DYER. The new North German Lloyd steamer Kron Prinz Wilhelm, on her trial trip from Bergen to Leith, reached a speed of nearly 24 knots per hour without forced draught, justifying the belief that she is the fastest merchant vessel in the world. Externally she appears to be a duplicate of the Kaiser Wilhelm der Grosser. She is most luxuriously fitted up. She sails for New York on Sept. 17.

UNITED STATES INTERESTS SAFE. The navy department has received the following telegram from Commander Sargant, of the Machias, who has sent to Boca de Toro to ascertain if American interests in that quarter were in danger. "I have just returned from Boca de Toro, I do not consider the lives and property of American citizens in the least endangered. The island of Provision, distance three miles from town. FRANCE REFUSES. Paris, Sept. 12.—It is expected in official circles here that the Sultan of Turkey will ask the French government, now that the Tabini claim has been settled by direct negotiation, to resume diplomatic relations. France, however, will reject any such proposition.

The attitude of the sultan toward the French claims is undoubtedly attributable to the execution of the decree of the French minister of the interior in expelling Turkish spies from France. The decree had been held back for several days in the hope that the sultan would take the hint, but the sultan's government was finally exhausted, and Feroudin Bey, head of the Turkish police in Paris, and another spy were ordered to leave France.

CABLE NOTES. Japan has sentenced the assassin of Hoshi Toru to hard labor for life. British men-of-war have begun to use Cape Breton coal.

The Belgian government is drawing up a bill providing for the total suppression of Sunday newspapers. The largest oil factory in Austria was burned Monday night. The damage amounts to four million crowns.

France will employ 25,000 troops to protect Czar Nicholas from anarchists during his visit to their territory. Upon the recommendation of Commander-in-Chief Earl Roberts about 5,000 men have been garrisoned for meritorious conduct in connection with the South African war.

The man who on June 21 last fatally stabbed at Yokohama, Hosi Toru, who was minister of communications in the last Ito cabinet, and who was formerly Japanese minister at Washington, has been sentenced to hard labor for life.

The Channel and the Mediterranean fleets of the British navy have fought a sham battle outside of Lagos, lasting two hours. As in the case of the Turkish police in Paris, and another spy were ordered to leave France.

## IN THE SAME GRAVE

Burial of Mr. and Mrs. Pettier, Who Were Killed on the M. C. R.

Windsor, Sept. 12.—Mr. and Mrs. Jacques Pettier, the victims of last Friday's crossing accident on the Michigan Central, were buried on Monday side by side in the same grave in the cemetery of Assumption Church, Sandwich. This is the second time in 200 years that a man and his wife have thus been buried in that graveyard. The funeral was attended by nearly 800 people, and the services were conducted by Rev. Father Senade.

COMES HIGH. Toronto, Sept. 12.—The reception and entertainment of the Duke and Duchess of Cornwall and York will come high, so far as this city is concerned. The civic reception committee was astounded by the receipt of a letter from Prof. Torrington asking for a fee of \$1,000 for training and leading the reception choir. A letter from Col. Otter asks the city not only to remove the fences around the exhibition grand stand for the review, but to level the ground also. The work would cost about \$5,000. Private citizens are beginning to spend money freely on preparations for illuminations and two big arches are being constructed—the manufacturers' and Foresters'.

PLOT TO KILL THE DUKE (?). Montreal, Sept. 12.—Mayor Prefontaine received a letter yesterday in his mail postmarked Montreal, and signed by Giovanni Cabani, informing him that twelve Italians have reached the city from Paterson, N. J., for the purpose of murdering the Duke of Cornwall and York when he comes to Montreal. Cabani claims to be a loyal Canadian, and gives information because, he says, he does not want the fame of his country smirched any more. It is not known yet whether the letter is a hoax or not.

IN THE PRESIDENT'S FAVOR. Washington, Sept. 12.—President McKinley is a total abstainer from intoxicating drinks, and this habit is said to be very much in his favor now. It is related that once on making arrangements for a journey he was importuned to take something to stimulate him before the trip.
