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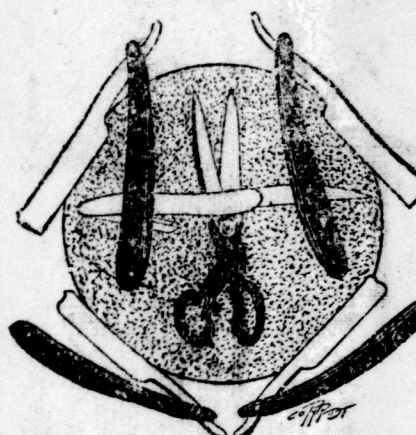

THE CALL FROM TORONTO
PRESENTED TO DR. SOWERBY

A strong deputation, representing the congregation of the College Street Baptist Church, Toronto, waited on Rev. Dr. Sowerby, pastor of the Talbot Street Baptist Church, last night, and presented the call which the Toronto church recently decided to extend to him. The deputation was headed by Prof. Goodspeed, of McMaster University, and many reasons were set forth by it in support of the call. Rev. Dr. Sowerby postponed his decision for a week in order to give the members of his present charge an opportunity to take what action they may deem wise.

The removal of his pastor to Toronto would be a source of regret to the people of Talbot Street Church, for Dr. Sowerby has done a remarkable work there since he took the pastorate a few years ago. He has increased the membership until it is now close to the 500 mark, and it is a common occurrence for many persons to be turned away from the Sunday evening services. Financially, he has put the church on a splendid basis, and to have him leave at the present time is undesirable for more than one reason. No definite steps have been taken along that line, but they have been contemplated for a long time. The congregation will be heard from next week, likely, as Mr. Sowerby will give his answer to the Toronto church about the end of the month.

The call is to one of the most modern churches in the Queen City, with a membership of 500 and a salary of \$2,000. The church and accompanying buildings are new and they are much larger than those of Talbot Street.

Jury Views Remains of Engineer Douglas and Adjourns.
