Toronto, Jan. 23 .- In response to a depu-Toronto, Jan. 23.—In response to a deputation of single taxers who waited upon him yesterday to ask that municipalities be given the option of abolishing the taxation of improvements, as in Manitoba, Premier Ross said he was struck with the reasonableness of the proposition, especially as applied to the newer districts of the province. The whole matter, however, would be dealt with by the assessment commission in its report. OBJECT TO REFERENDUM.

The problem of sewage disposal is becoming very serious for the towns and cities of Ontario that are not near the lakes, and a large deputation waited upon the government to ask that a sewage experimental station should be established to help to solve the problem that confronts them. 
