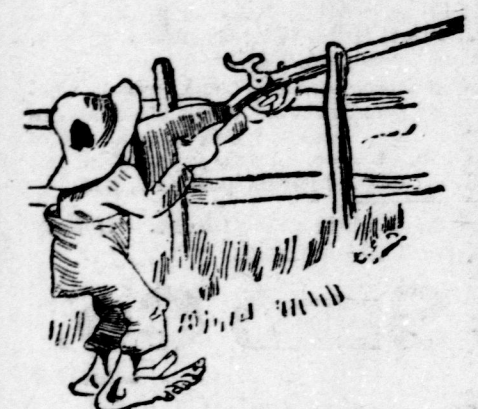

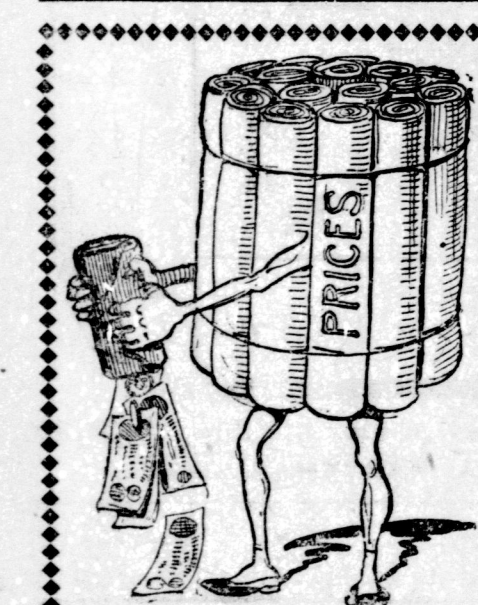

Westminster Church About to Celebrate Its Jubilee As An Independent Charge

One week from tomorrow, Sunday, May 22, there will begin a jubilee celebration in Westminster that will be of the greatest interest—it is the 50th anniversary of the existence of the First Presbyterian Church as a separate and independent congregation. The celebration will continue for ten days, with the jubilee sermons on May 23, and the great social gathering on Wednesday, June 1. The congregation is putting forth every effort to make the occasion memorable in the history of the township. Many former residents of Westminster are coming back to participate in the jubilee.

The Westminster Presbyterian

After the union of the Free and U. P. Churches in Canada, in 1861, the Free congregation at Hubrey united with the First Church, and after the great Presbyterian union of 1875, St. Andrew's, South Westminster (which had been connected with the Church of Scotland) and the First Church became one united charge. Ever since that time the congregation has gone on prospering, and splendid work has been done by the different pastors. At present there is not a cent of debt in connection with either of the churches. The membership is large and both Sunday schools are thoroughly equipped and doing splendid work.

his own congregation is much beloved. During his ministerial career Dr. McCrae has been pastor of the First Presbyterian Church of the city of Jamestown, N. Y.; the Presbyterian Church, Cobourg, and the Collingwood Church, three very large and important charges. The church and manse at First Westminster are situated in one of the most ideal spots to be found in Ontario. From Westminster station to the heart of the city is but ten minutes by train, so that the congregation is really a sort of suburban charge.

The first jubilee service will be held, as stated above, on May 22, when Rev.

Dr. McCrae will preach. The following Sabbath, Rev. James Wilson, M.A., of Glenora, will conduct the services, and it is hoped that Rev. Principal Caven, of Toronto, may be able to preach the special jubilee sermons on May 23. On Wednesday, the first day of June, the social gathering connected with the jubilee will be held in the church and on the beautiful church and manse grounds. There will be forenoon and afternoon meetings in the church, when addresses, historical sketches, reminiscences and music suitable to the occasion will be given. At noon there will be an adjournment for two hours for dinner and social fellowship. Altogether the occasion promises to be a most memorable and delightful one. The services will close with a jubilee communion service on the first Sabbath of June, conducted by the pastor.
