There is no comedienne on the American stage who can sing a topical song like Blanche Ring. There is a swing and an unconsciousness about her work that is catching, and audiences never fail to respond. She made her first appearance at the Grand Opera House last night, and was greeted by a large audience. That all were enthusiastic is putting it mildly. Miss Ring is now numbered among the world's theatrical idols, and she will always be certain of an enthusiastic welcome when she returns. She will appear again tonight in "The Yankee Girl" at the Grand.

As for the vehicle, it is largely Miss Ring. The plot, if it may be dignified by that term, deals with one of those pseudo Latin American municipalities which have been so productive of comic operas and opera bouffe. In doing so she, as an American girl, shows that aptitude for practical things that is supposed to be the honor and glory of the maidens of the United States. As would be suspected the play ends well, with the American eagle rampant and the stars and stripes couched.

However, the plot is not the thing—Blanche Ring was it. She carried the whole play on her shoulders, and was equal to the task. There was no dull moments when she was about, and she proved herself a lady who could do much hard work and do it pleasantly.

Her abundant good nature, and her interesting personality made every idle situation pleasing, and in the more active scenes made them almost glorious.

Her songs are immense. The piece has had to be provided with new songs this season, and it must be said that she has selected some good ones.

Among the real hits were "Top of the Morning," "Where's Mamma," "Louisiana Elizabeth," and others, but the real popular song of the performance was "Nora Malone." Miss Ring must have sung this song a dozen times for the audience, and they allowed her to go, not because they did not longer care for it, but they did not wish to keep Miss Ring singing until morning.

So insistent were the demands for songs that Miss Ring sang "Rings on My Fingers" and "Yip-I-Addy." The way the gallery took these songs up and sang them was inspiring.

The night was a signal triumph for Miss Ring, and she should be well pleased with her reception last night.

The supporting company is good. Harry Gilfoil, a comedian of ability, furnishes most of the fun, and he does it well. Miss Juliette Lang is a pleasing singer, while the others are excellent.

A HORSE-DRAWN STEAM FIRE ENGINE

No. 3 Committee of City Council Decided to Buy One.

AUTO IS EXPERIMENT

Tender of Canadian Fire Engine Company, of London, Beat Out All Competitors.

A horse-drawn steam fire engine will be purchased by the city council. At least No. 3 committee at its meeting last night recommended that the tender of the Canadian Fire Engine Company, of this city, to furnish a 1,000-gallon engine for \$5,300, was recommended to be accepted. There were many tenders received.

Mr. T. H. Purdom, K.C., Mr. D. H. Gilles, and Mr. Robert Angus represented the local concern. Mr. Purdom in addressing the committee, pointed out that the auto engine was in the experimental stage as yet, and that it would be much wiser to allow other cities to do the experimenting. London was in the snow belt, and it had not been demonstrated that autos could run all winter in this climate.

Horses Are All Right.

A good team of horses would get to a fire in the congested district just as soon as an auto. Mr. Purdom read letters from the fire chiefs of Detroit, Chicago, and Cleveland, all of whom recommended that the city should purchase a steam fire engine. It was a London industry and should be supported.

Mr. R. B. Cameron, of Toronto, agent for the Vatroous engine, declared that they had sold 25 engines during the past five years, and 149 of their engines were in use now. His engine had stood the test everywhere.

Tenders Opened.

The deputations then withdrew, after which the tenders were opened. The price of the London engine was \$5,300, while the Vatroous was quoted at \$5,500. The latter company quoted a motor engine at \$11,500. The lowest price for a motor was that of the Webb company, St. Louis, who asked \$10,350 for a 750-gallon engine.

A long debate followed. Ald. Ashplant read a large volume of correspondence in which he gave the comparative cost of maintaining a horse engine and a motor engine.

Ald. Fitzgerald then moved that the tender of the Canadian Fire Engine Company be accepted, provided that the engine passed a satisfactory test.

Chief Aitken pointed out that an expert would have to be provided, as he was not competent to judge of an engine. The committee will secure an expert, as soon as the engine is delivered to conduct the necessary tests.

A Good Suggestion.

Building Inspector Graydon suggested that cards be printed warning livestock owners, etc., of the clause in the building bylaws which provided a penalty for the careless use of matches, cigars, etc., in such a class of building. The committee agreed with the suggestion, and the cards will be printed.

Chief Aitken reported that the new service truck had been placed in commission, and inspected by Ald. J. H. Saunders. With the exception of one fault the truck was all right. This had been corrected, and the rig is now giving the best of a satisfaction.

Firemen's Fund.

Ald. Rose suggested that the money received from business firms by the fire chief be divided among the men, rather than being placed in a fund at the city hall. However, the majority of the committee thought it should form a nucleus for a fund, and on motion of Ald. Jeffries, the check for \$50 sent by Mr. A. E. Somerville and Mr. C. G. Carlin, of the Rex Fire Company, was placed to the credit of the firemen at the city hall.

To Help the Dogs.

Ald. Ashplant was instructed to interview City Solicitor Meredith to have the dog bylaw amended in such a way as to allow dogs to run unmuzzled.

Those present were Ald. Ashplant (chairman), Ald. Rose, Ald. Jeffries, Ald. Fitzgerald, Mayor Beattie, Head Engineer Van Cleave, Market Clerk Baker, Inspector H. Dreany and Secretary Baker.

MRS. BATES' FARE SENT TO HAMILTON

Woman Whose Husband Ill-Treated Her Will Be Witness at Inquest Tonight.

Hamilton, Nov. 3.—Mrs. J. Bates, who is residing with her mother on Hess street north, called at police headquarters today to make arrangements to attend the inquest into the death of her child at London tonight. Her husband was convicted recently of ill-treating her and the child, and last week the child died in a hospital in London.

Mrs. Bates is in rather poor circumstances, and Chief Smith has written to the coroner in London asking him to arrange for Mrs. Bates transportation.

Bates was sentenced the day the child died, and whether or not another charge will be laid against him will depend on the medical evidence at the inquest.

The Dundas police have a warrant for Bates' arrest on a charge of desertion, and will likely ask the London police to arrest him at the expiration of his sentence.

Crown Attorney McKillop has sent the money to Mrs. Bates to bring her to London.

PRISONERS REMANDED.

Toronto, Nov. 2.—Walter J. Bell and Charles G. Jones were in police court this morning on charges of burglary each, and were remanded until Monday. Meantime the police are endeavoring to learn whether the prisoners know anything about the murder of a Chinaman at Streetsville in June last.

TWO OF THE STRIKERS DISCHARGED AT HAMILTON

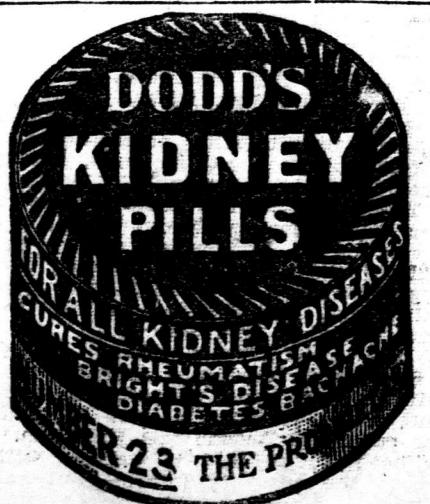
G. T. R. Men of the Ambitious City Are Said To Be Alarmed.

Hamilton, Nov. 2.—Great excitement was caused among the local Grand Trunk employees yesterday afternoon, when two of the strikers who were reinstated as Assistant Superintendent Bowker, of London, Conductors Connors and O'Reilly, who were placed on their old runs for several weeks and then laid off again, were called to the office of the local assistant superintendent of the middle division shortly after noon yesterday and informed that their services were no longer required. Although the railway official explained to the two employees the reason for their discharge, the latter refused to divulge it this morning, although they had a conference last evening with Thos. Todd, a member of the grievance committee of the union.

prominent part in the recent trouble are looking upon the official's action yesterday with alarm. It was pointed out by one of them this morning that they could not complain against the railway company, as the latter had lived up to its agreement as far as taking the men back had been concerned, and there was no clause that he knew of whereby the company was forced to give steady employment to any employees. A member of the general committee stated this morning that the matter would be taken up in a few days and a thorough investigation made by the officials of the union.

Up to noon today the local officials of the railway had received no instructions as to the re-engagement of the two strikers still out in Hamilton. Both of these are members of the general committee, and although they have applied several times at the Stuart street depot they have not been given work. They are waiting, however, until tomorrow morning before taking any action.

Of the 212 strikers in the middle division all but seven have been reinstated.
