HOMES ABLAZE AND **NEARLY 30 BELOW**

Six Montreal Families Were Turned Out Into the Biting Cold.

BADLY FROST BITTEN

Number of Firemen Also Suffer From Weather, While Fighting the Conflagration.

Montreal, Jan. 6 .- With the mercury about 20 below zero, a big fire broke out here on Plessis and Sherbrooke open air in their night attire. Several of them were badly frost-bitten before they could be got under cover. The fire was a picturesque one, the water from the hose freezing as it sprayed upon the houses.

A number of firemen also suffered from frost-bitten face and hands. The damage done will amount to about \$30,000. The fire was able to make greater progress than it should have done because most of the city's fire-fighting apparatus was attending several other fires which were taking place at the same time, and was de layed in reaching the scene,


