## Drowned at Windsor When Barge Upset

Reford Bouford Was Unable to Swim—Six Others in Peril.

Windsor, May 27.—Reford Bouford, of Amherstburg, was drowned, and four other men, a woman and a little girl narrowly escaped a similar fate when the sand barge Tolmie, of Wal-kerville, capsized in Lake St. Clair, two and one-half miles north of Wind-mill Point, last night.

The Brooks and Tolmie were bound down with sand. A heavy sea was running and the Tolmie sprang a leak. The crew began to jettison the cargo, but removed too much from one side, and the boat started to heel over, finally upsetting. As it went over, Bouford leaped into the lake and was not seen again. James Schroll, one of the crew, had his wife and 2½-year-old daughter, Leda, aboard. Schroll grasped the child and the Tolmie lurched, and he managed to climb on the craft's side.

Mrs. Schroll and two members of the crew, unable to obtain a hold, were hurled into the lake. They grasped wreckage and supported Mrs. Schroll in the water until all were picked up. Meanwhile Schroll, the child and the other men were clinging to the slippery bottom of the Tolmie, with waves washing over them.

The Tolmie is owned by C. A. Chilver, Walkerville. She was valued at \$6,000, and carried no insurance.

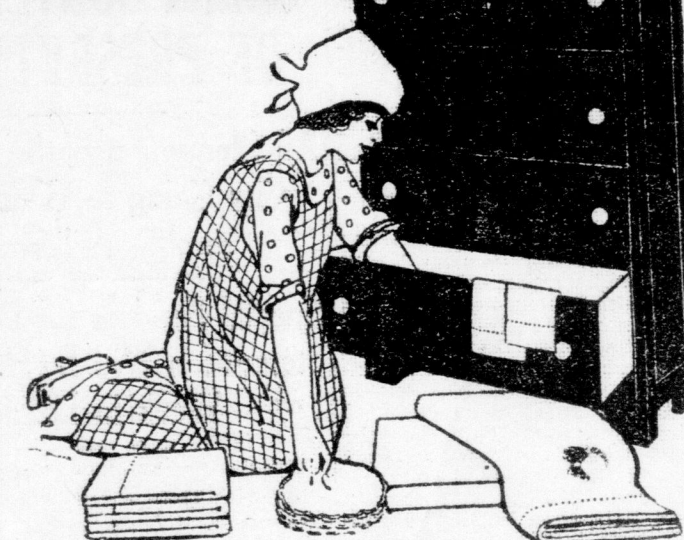

Brantford Street Car Men Will Get More Money Shortly.

## WRECK ON C. P. R.

Spread Rail Resulted in Engine and Cars Leaving Tracks.

Arthur, May 27.—A spread rail re-sulted in the engine, tender, baggage and mail cars on C. P. R. express No. 711, leaving the rails near here today. The baggage and mail cars left the rails and ran along over the ties, tearing and cutting them into splinters. The first coach, in which all the pas-sengers were, remained upright. The front of the rear coach buried itself in the roadbed, so that the body of the coach tore itself loose from it at the same time, rolling on its side and into the ditch. The brakeman was the only person in that coach at this time. Presence of mind saved him from serious injury, for as he felt the coach roll sideways he grasped a seat and hung tightly to it till the coach had settled.
