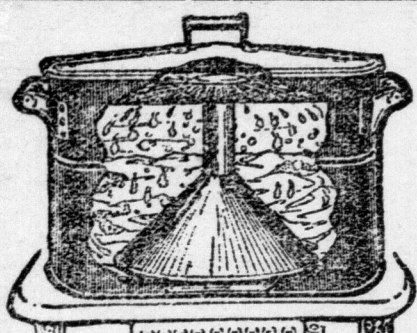

Stomach Troubles Due to Acidity

FUGITIVE BANKER IS FOUND IN MONTREAL

Montreal, Jan. 26.—Samuel L. Bleir, for whom the police of Pittsburgh, Pa., have been searching since Sept. 20 last, was arrested here today by secret service men in the employ of a detective agency.

Bleir is wanted in McKees Rock, Pa., to answer to a charge of stealing \$15,000 from the Victor Banking Company. The bank, a private institution, of which Lewis Anselmi was president and owner, was obliged to close its doors following Bleir's disappearance.

Bleir was taken before Judge Choquet, sitting as extradition commissioner, when he entered a plea of not guilty and waived extradition proceedings, stating that he was prepared to return to Pittsburgh immediately for trial.

EXPLOSION ON OCEAN LINER.

Liverpool, Jan. 26.—An explosion occurred today on the Cunard liner Mauretania, which is in dock undergoing repairs. Four men were killed and many injured. A bottle of condensed gas which was being used in a brazing process in the engine room blew up from some unknown reason, causing tremendous havoc among the engine fitters. Several of the injured are in a serious condition.

GET \$5; CANNOT SPEND IT

El Paso, Texas, Jan. 26.—Although they are to be sheltered and fed indefinitely by the United States Government, the Mexican soldiers from Ojinaga who are interned at Fort Bliss, received from their own Government today some of the pay due them for fighting before they crossed the Rio Grande.

Each Mexican soldier received \$5, his first pay for months, and according to General Salvador Mercada, the commander, the last.

None of the foreign soldiers was permitted to leave the reservation to spend the money.

TO INVESTIGATE ALLEGED TORTURE OF SUFFRAGETTES

If Bishops Can Obtain Permission They Will Visit Holloway Jail.

PROMISE MADE TO WOMEN

Militants Expect to See King and Will Not Prostrate Themselves Before Him.

London, Jan. 26.—The Bishop of London, the Right Rev. Arthur Foley Winnington Ingram, tonight promised a deputation from the Women's Social and Political Union that if he can obtain the home secretary's consent he will in the course of a few days visit Holloway Jail, accompanied by the Bishop of Kensington, in order to investigate the allegations that three suffragettes imprisoned there suffer excruciating torture while being subjected to forcible feeding. If official permission is obtained the two bishops will witness the operation.

This projected action on the part of the bishops is the outcome of statements made at a meeting of the militants' union, by Miss Florence Ansell, recently released from Holloway, that while there she heard shrieks and moans twice daily proceeding from the opposite cell occupied by Rachel Peace, who is serving an 18 months' sentence.

To Call on King.
At the same meeting Miss Barbara Wylie, referring to the purpose of the militants to call on the King, as announced by Mrs. Dacre-Fox a week ago, said that the deputation would not prostrate themselves before the throne as Sir Edward Carson, the Unionist leader, said the Ulsterites would, but would stand before his majesty erect. She did not think that the deputations would find any difficulty in obtaining an audience with the King. If nothing came of it the women still had the same right to fight as Ulster.

BLAZE AT BURLINGTON

Loss in Early Morning Fire Will Reach \$30,000.

Burlington, Jan. 27.—Fire broke out here at 1 o'clock this morning in the planing mills and lumber yard of A. Coates & Sons, and the entire property was destroyed, with a loss of between \$25,000 and \$30,000. The premises are surrounded by residences which were in grave danger, but were saved by the strenuous efforts of the volunteer fire brigade. The town has a good waterworks system, and was well served in this instance by eight lines of hose playing on the fire.

"EMERGENCY" CRY TO BE HEARD AGAIN SAYS HON. MR. KING

Another Flag-Waving Campaign To Be Inaugurated in Canada.

STRONG SPEECH AT BERLIN

Over Three Hundred North Waterloo Liberals Attend a Banquet.

[Special to The Advertiser.]

Berlin, Jan. 26.—Premier Borden and his government at Ottawa were roundly scored by H. H. W. L. Mackenzie King this evening at a large and enthusiastic banquet of the Laurier Club in Concordia Hall, for neglecting to announce a policy that would hasten the prosperous times that existed during the Liberal administration from 1896 to 1911.

He asked his hearers if they ever heard factory whistles blowing at 4 and 5 o'clock in the day when the Liberals were in power, or if there were as many unemployed in the cities as there are under the Conservative administration. He maintained that while reciprocity was defeated in 1911, the conditions which the Liberals predicted would result unless a wider market was provided for the farmers of the West have come about.

The superiority of the western farmer to ship his wheat to a larger market near at hand has created a congestion, with the result that the trade between the West and the East has been greatly reduced and there has been an overproduction of manufactured goods in the East.

Another Emergency

Mr. King also spoke on the navy issue at some length, and pointed out that instead of there being an emergency as was maintained at the last session of the house it was merely a measure of expediency. He, however, warned his hearers that the last of the "emergency" cry has not been heard. He deduced from the speech delivered by Mr. Borden on the address from the throne the other day that some Government representative would go to England and find out from the admiralty whether the three largest dreadnoughts in the world were still required, and on receiving an affirmative answer will return to Canada to inaugurate another flag-waving campaign, and every Liberal or independent man who will oppose the contribution will be classed as a traitor to the Empire. Mr. King strongly denounced the extravagant expenditures of the Government during the two years they have been in power, and predicted that when the next appeal is made to the people of Canada the Liberal party throughout Canada will be swept into power, under the starry leadership of Sir Wilfrid Laurier.

Over 300 Present.

President J. R. Haley presided, and addresses were delivered by Mayor Euler, H. J. Simes, Dr. Simes, Dr. J. F. Honsberger, Mr. Johnston representing the Federated Liberal Club in Ontario, Geo. Gibbons (of London) and Rev. J. E. Lynn. Music was provided by the Starmann orchestra and the Excelsior quartette. Over 300 Liberals young and old from all parts of North Waterloo were in attendance.

London, Jan. 26.—Sir Edward Carson, leader of the Ulsterites, in a speech at Lincoln tonight, said that he was ready to join John Redmond, the Irish Nationalist leader, in an attempt to extend real local government to Ireland, or to remove any abuses or injustices, social or religious. Referring to Mr. Redmond's speech at Waterford on Sunday, he declared: "If this is the last word from his side we are in a lamentable and critical state of affairs. I am a man of peace, but not of peace at any price."

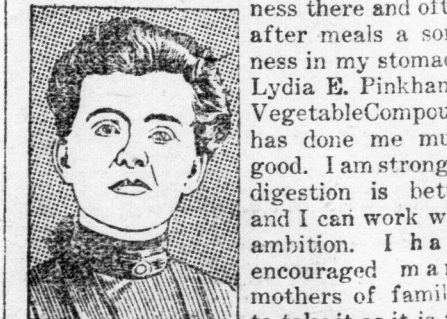

San Jose, Cal., Jan. 26.—Frank E. Murray, convicted forger, was sentenced today by Superior Judge William Beasley to serve two years as a hermit in the mountains forty miles from here.
