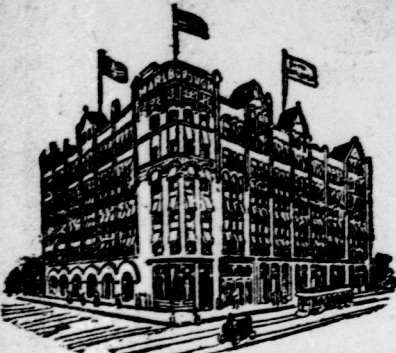

DUTCH STEAMER SUBMARINE VICTIM

Torpedoed While Lying Quietly At Anchor In the North Sea.

HOLLAND NOW AROUSED

"Proof of German Friendship" Too Much For Netherlands People.

[Canadian Press.]

LONDON, April 15.—6.15 p.m.—The Netherlands steamer Katwyk from Baltimore for Rotterdam, was torpedoed yesterday evening while anchored seven miles to the west of the North Hinder Lightship in the North Sea. The crew of 23 men were saved and taken aboard the lightship.

A dispatch to Reuters from Flushing reports the arrival there of the crew of the Katwyk. The men say that while the night watch changed a severe shock was felt and the ship began to sink. As the steamer was sinking the crew took to the boats and while rowing away saw the periscope of a submarine, which quickly disappeared.

The Katwyk sank fifteen minutes after the explosion.

Lying At Anchor.

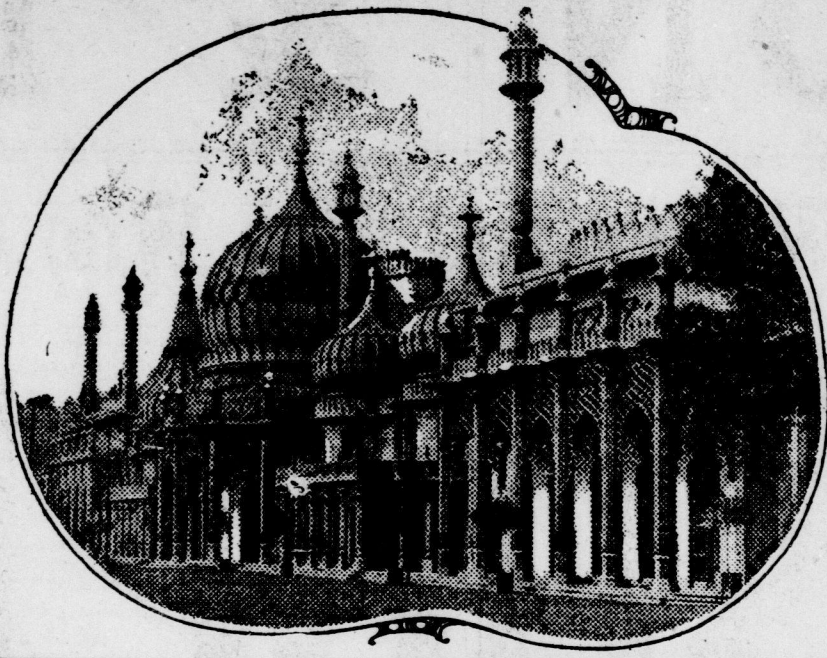
Reuters' Amsterdam correspondent says the Katwyk had been lying at anchor for fifteen minutes when she was torpedoed on the port side. The correspondent says a message received from the Hook of Holland declares that all the ship's lights were burning at the time of the attack. After the torpedo struck the Katwyk caught fire and only the ship's papers could be saved.

The Rotterdam Maasbrogge says of the incident: "It is quite impossible to establish a connection between the sinking of the Katwyk and the commercial war between England and Germany even in its bitterest form. While the action of German submarines formerly was regarded as a regrettable consequence of the general rules made by the belligerents, a similar interpretation now no longer is possible, if the particulars thus far available are true and the sinking of the vessel was due to a German submarine."

The Katwyk was a freight steamer. Built in 1902 she was 1,287 tons and 281 feet long. She sailed from Baltimore March 26 for Rotterdam and passed Dover April 14.

Trawlers Released.

LONDON, April 15.—2.10 a.m.—A dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company from Yarmouth says that the four Dutch trawlers taken by German warships into Cuxhaven have been released.

LONDON, April 15.—3.42 a.m.—A Budapest dispatch to the Post says:

"The desire for peace is the overwhelming sentiment noticeable throughout Hungary the last few days. How absorbed the people are in this idea can be seen at a glance in the newspapers, which, in almost every issue, contain prominent allusions, editorials and expressions of opinion along this line."

For several days there has been scarcely any public speech or statement on the war or the political situation, which did not touch on the subject. Pronouncedly, the Government newspapers are leading the peace campaign. It is not yet easy, however, to say what terms would be acceptable officially."

MUST ASK FOR TERMS.

LONDON, April 15.—2.49 a.m.—A Petrograd dispatch to the Daily Mail says:

"While denying categorically that Austria has made any direct peace advances to Russia, officials here admit that peace suggestions have come from the Pope at the instigation of private persons in Austria-Hungary."

"The Pope's communication merely asked whether Austria was willing, Russia would enter into negotiations with a view to peace. The answer was that if Austria desired peace she must ask the allies for their conditions, which would then be considered and communicated to the Austrian Government."

RUSSIANS CLAIM FURTHER ADVANCE

Germans Renew Their Efforts Against Ossowetz—Attempt a Failure.

PETROGRAD, April 15.—(Via London, April 15, 12.35 a.m.)—The official communication issued by the war office tonight says:

"At Ossowetz Wednesday the enemy ineffectually attempted an advance on the Russian position."

"In the direction of Miawa we were successful in outpost fights."

"On the left bank of the Dnava River Russian outposts occupied Koudtzen, in the Sochaczew region."

"In the Carpathians the Russians advanced slightly in the region north of the Uzok Pass, where 200 prisoners were taken. The enemy's attacks on the heights of Semuth and Volosait, near Yamonow and to the south of Kozioiwka were successfully repelled."

AUSTRIAN REPORT.

VIENNA, via London, April 15.—3.10 p.m.—The following official communication was issued today:

"In West Galicia, near Cieszkowice, on the Biala, a Russian attack made early on the morning of the 14th failed."

"On the heights on both sides of the Wyssokie, on the Stry, strong Russian forces attacked our positions, but were repulsed after severe fighting. In a counter-attack we captured an important height, taking three officers and 661 men prisoners."

"In the remainder of the Carpathians, except in some sectors, there were only artillery engagements."

"In Southeast Galicia and Bukowina no actions are reported."

FRENCH SHELL QUARTERS OF ENEMY'S STAFF

PARIS (via London), April 15.—The official statement issued by the war office tonight says:

"A German aviator dropped bombs on the hospital at Mourmelon. By way of reprisal for the bombardment of Nancy by a Zeppelin, one of our aeroplanes dropped five bombs on the German headquarters. All the projectiles fell on the buildings in which the imperial staff were installed at Meziere and Charleville. We also bombarded the station of Freiburg im Breisgau."

"Finally, a flying squadron of fifteen machines dropped bombs with complete success on the German military buildings at Ostend. Our aeroplanes were violently cannonaded, but all returned unscathed."

DUTCH CALL IT GRAVEST INCIDENT OF SUB. WARFARE

THE HAGUE (via London), April 15.—10.20 p.m.—The sinking of the Dutch steamer Katwyk is considered here the gravest incident of the submarine warfare, as it directly affects the Dutch Government, to which the cargo of grain on board the steamer was consigned.

While awaiting further details of the torpedoing of the Katwyk, the ministerial departments concerned discussed the matter today but declined to make a statement.

PORTSMOUTH DOCKYARDS ARE DAMAGED BY FIRE

LONDON, April 7. (Correspondence of the Canadian Press).—There was a rumor in London the night of January 31 that a serious fire had broken out in the big Government dockyards at Portsmouth, but the Government smothered all inquiries with a prompt denial and the rumor was eliminated all mention of the matter from press dispatches. It now appears that the fire was of a very serious character, and came near wiping out the docks and other valuable properties at Portsmouth. The extent of the damage is still carefully concealed. It is the common belief in official circles that the fire was the work of incendiaries presumably German spies.

Today a carefully worded notice was issued by the dockyard authorities, offering a reward of \$500 for the discovery of the incendiaries responsible for the fire at the building slip sheds the night of January 31.

SUGGEST STRIKE TO STOP THE WAR

Union Men of New York Would Tie Up All Production.

NEW YORK, April 15. — Resolutions calling upon organized labor throughout the United States to "seriously consider at once the proposition of a general strike among those industries employed in the production of ammunition and food supplies," for the use of warring European nations, were adopted tonight at a mass meeting called by the Central Federated Union of Greater New York and vicinity, to consider a peace movement. Ways and means for enforcing immediate peace in Europe were demanded, the resolutions declared, by labor, which "furnishes the fighting material and pays the expenses and produces all materials for the conflict."

The co-operation of the American people was asked for in the peace effort. The resolutions also favored the authorization of a labor delegation of three "to visit the labor centers of the belligerents, and confer with them upon the best positive method" to bring the war to an end.

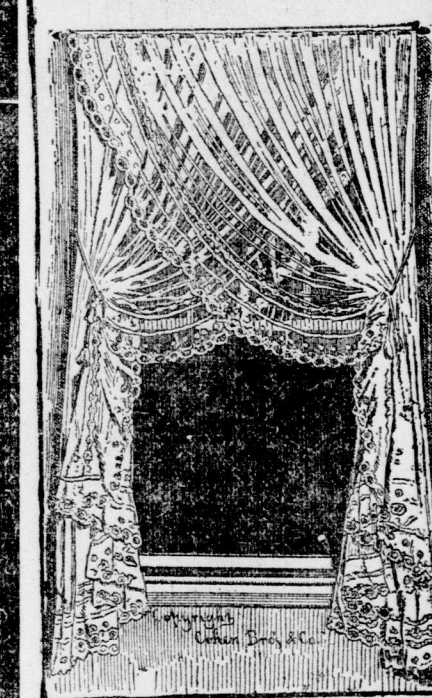

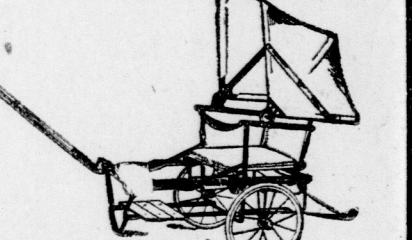
