ASSURED OF BIG BOOM

Building Will Increase To an  
Unequal Extent Is  
Assurance.

West London people are so well pleased with the success of their efforts to have met with in connection with stirring up the sewerage matter and getting things started that they may ask the council next year to go ahead with a sewerage system. Many of the ratepayers are of the opinion that a system could be installed at a comparatively small cost which would connect with the city sewers at Evergreen avenue.

"Of course," said one man today, "it would be necessary to pump the sewage to meet the city system, but this could be done at a small cost by the installation of a motor. A sewerage system of people have their eye on lots. Even with what has been accomplished so far towards getting the sewerage started much building has commenced. West Londoners see no reason why sewers shouldn't be laid. They are willing to pay their share of them."

"After we get the sewerage system we will use a building house on the river not equalled by any other part of the city. There is any amount of splendid land to be had at reasonable prices, and scores of people have their eye on lots. Even with what has been accomplished so far towards getting the sewerage started much building has commenced. West Londoners see no reason why sewers shouldn't be laid. They are willing to pay their share of them."

NO PASSPORTS GIVEN

PASSENGERS REMOVED

The reasons given for the removal of the passengers were that they were apparently of German birth.
