## BRITAIN IS TO REMOVE CATTLE **EMBARGO SOON**

Commission Named To Investigate Returns Favorable Report.

ENDS 30 YEARS' FIGHT

London, Sept. 15.—(Canadian Press Cable).—The British cattle embargo commission reports entirely favorable to the admission of Canadian cattle. It rejects the disease theory, but admits that the removal of the embargo would have a certain prejudicial effect on Scottish and Irish farming interests.

m giving their conclusions regarding the importation of Canadian cattle the embargo commission says: "We are of the opinion that the admission would tend to increase the meat supply of the country to some extent, but it must not be assumed that the increase would necessarily be equivalent to the whole number of cattle so admitted, as some would merely replace store cattle raised here. We think that such admis-sion would cheapen in some measure the meat supply, but we have no data whereou that extent can be accurately assumed that the increase whereon that extent can be accurately gauged. We think in the long run the tendency would be to bring prices to a level somewhat, but not gre than they would be if the embargo was
