# ATTENDANCE AT FAIR TODAY EXCEEDS EVEN WEDNESDAY'S RECORD

Col. W. M. Gartshore, President of Western Fair Board, Is Delighted With This Year's Crowds—Live Stockmen Praise the High Standard of Cattle Shown by Fellow Competitors.

There is an old song that runs, "Thursday Always Was My Jonah Day," but President Gartshore of the Western Fair Board and the directors have no cause to fear anything like a "Jonah" day at the fair grounds, as the attendance promises to exceed by several thousands Wednesday's large attendance.

Col. Gartshore stated at noon today that there was a good "comfortable" crowd on the grounds, and an estimated attendance at that time at about 12,000. It is expected that over 40,000 people will pass through the turnstiles by the time the evening performance in front of the grandstands is in full swing.

Quite Satisfied. "Are you satisfied with the attendance so far?" the general president of the fair was asked by The Advertiser. "I certainly am," was the emphatic reply. "We had the biggest day yesterday," he continued, "and I think that today will equal Wednesday's figures. We have just about as many people as we can handle comfortably. Wednesday of fair week has always been looked upon as 'Farmers' Day' but the agriculturalists are gradually being weaned away from Wednesday as being their own special property. They feel possibly that they can see the live stock to better advantage when the buildings are not so crowded. At any rate, there were goodly numbers of farmers making a tour of the cattle barns this morning, and their keen eyes were taking in the good points of the various animals."

Many Newcomers. One of the outstanding features of this year's exhibition is the large number of newcomers in the cattle business who are showing their prize stuff for the first time. Although some of them did not get very high in the prize money, they were all greatly encouraged, and promised to make it worth the big fellows at next year's fair. The Advertiser man wandered down through the cattle sheds this morning, and had some interesting conversations with the various exhibitors. He was shown the grand champion Hereford bull, Brae Real XIII, who has yet to meet defeat in the show ring. Owned by McNeil & McNeil of Dutton, he was the junior champion at the fair in 1919, and the Canadian-bred champion and end of the show.
