SCORES THIRTY LINE FOR MAIDEN VOTERS

Victorian Order Inspector Points To Fine Service of Younger Women.

"Do you see the Ottawa papers? Look for my views in the subject of unmarried women under 30 being disqualified from voting. To hear some people talk you would think that the marriage ceremony miraculously endowed women with intelligence and a sense of citizenship. What do I think on the subject of disqualifying the 'under 30' from voting? Well, I trust Senator David will not drop dead when he reads it."

The speaker was a vivacious and capable young woman, and the interview with her by the Women's Department of The Advertiser started a long way from the subject of votes and suffrage. Miss Jessie Forshaw, Inspector for the Victorian Order of Nurses, had arrived in town bright and early Monday to see how the work of the order was getting along here. From the efficient service rendered by the V. O. nurses to women's work in general was an easy transition, and women's work suggested the exercise of the prerogatives of citizenship.

"But, if the noble senator does drop dead, wouldn't you consider it justifiable homicide?" asked the newspaper person.

"I hope the jury would take that view," laughingly replied Miss Forshaw. A moment later she was talking gravely of places of responsibility filled in Canada by young unmarried women under 30, in business, industrial and professional life, and the loads many of them are also carrying of family care and necessity for helping to support others.

Naturally, her mind turned to the work which is being done by nurses, and particularly the specially trained nurses of her own order, who require keen insight, skill in social diagnosis, as well as thorough knowledge of the science of trained nursing, in order to make them efficient as visiting nurses. Flowers, Salute Are I. O. O. F. Tribute

A beautiful tribute to the memory of the late Dr. C. L. T. Campbell, Past Grand Sire, was paid by the Independent Order of Oddfellows, Sunday afternoon, in connection with the church parade to the Centennial Methodist Church. "I have been through the records with Miss Symonds since coming in this morning," she said, "and I am more than ever convinced that London is getting a fine service, the nurses working to their capacity, paying an average of 1,000 visits a month."

A recent development in the order has been the establishment of Victorian Order of Nurses scholarships in public health, to replace the V. O. N. training schools. Under the circumstances, a part of Miss Forshaw's work on her present tour of inspection, which has carried her through the Maritime Provinces and Quebec, has been to see about assignments for the nurses taking the public health course, three of whom have just finished in London, the first in the Western University, Miss Gladys Wilson, Grace Cruise and Rita Selby. Two more of the eight or nine who have just completed the course are going into the Victorian Order in the fall, Miss Marjory White and Miss Inez Roach.

The first headquarters official to visit in London since the appointment of Dr. Malcolm T. McEachern as director-general of the order, Miss Forshaw had interesting information to give with regard to his proposed course of nursing service in the Dominion, with a view to eliminating overlapping, taking into consideration what is being done by other organizations, voluntary and otherwise.

Visits London in June. Of particular interest to London is the news that Dr. McEachern will probably pay his first visit here as a V. O. N. official about the middle of June, after the annual meeting of the order in Ottawa. "Dr. McEachern," said Miss Forshaw, "will endeavor to find out in his survey the form of work best adapted for urban and rural communities."

"In some communities, owing to the extent of other public health organizations, the bedside nursing seems to be the chief field of service for the order, coupled with the educational work that is done through this. In other communities the nurse must be able to handle the school work and other phases of public health. The idea is to get the best possible nursing service for Canada so far as the V. O. N. can do its part, with elimination of overlapping, and greatest economy in personnel and money."

Miss Forshaw, herself a former resident of Vancouver, a "native born" of British Columbia, resided in that province as a proud distinction, has known Dr. McEachern very well personally, and spoke in terms of high praise of his standing and ability. He organized the British Columbia Hospitals Association, and is vice-president of the American College of Surgeons, which works for the extension of the standardization of medical education. "His ability and experience will mean much, I am sure, in advancing the Victorian Order in opening for it a new era of usefulness."

Did Anybody Say Head Lettuce?

What Makes It Dear and Tough in London?

Why, can't London housewives buy tender head lettuce at a reasonable price? Why can't they get something besides wilted or rubbery outer leaves? Why can't superior head lettuce be grown in the vicinity of London, "the garden of Ontario," just as well as at other markets? As Mrs. Launder would say, "It's a burnin' question" for the housekeeper who is fond herself of head lettuce, and who likes to serve it by itself for salad or with any of the many combinations with which it is delectable. Compared with other places that might be mentioned, here are rarely first quality and invariably dear.

With all its delights and abundance, the Covent Garden market at certain times and on certain occasions must take a back seat for Toronto market when it comes to favorable prices for the consumers. Saturday morning, according to Toronto prices quoted by a reliable authority, head lettuce has two and three bunches for 25 cents. It wasn't discovered in the Covent Garden market. Tomatoes in Toronto sold for 15 cents a pound, green onions three bunches for 10 cents. The uniform price asked for onions on London market that day was 5 cents a bunch straight. Rhubarb in Toronto was offered at three bunches for 10 cents. London's price up to noon was 5 cents or even two for 15, though there was a rumor of a very big drop before night. Radishes in Toronto were four bunches for 25 cents as compared with two bunches for 15 in Aunt Maria's week-end market.

To be sure, eggs were a bit cheaper here, 28 to 29 cents as compared with 20 to 25 in Toronto. But apparently they set poultry by the pond there. Dressed chickens in Toronto were 40 cents a pound.

PRESBYTERIAN WOMEN RAISE \$332,886.83

General Council, Western Division W. M. S., Open Session in Galt.

Delegates from all the provinces in Canada, from Quebec on the east to British Columbia on the west, have arrived in Galt to attend the annual meeting of the general council of the Women's Missionary Society of the Presbyterian Church in Canada (Western Division), which opens Tuesday. Mrs. J. MacGillivray, president of the general council, who addressed the union Easter thanksgiving meeting of all the Presbyterian W. M. S. auxiliaries in London Easter week, will preside, and Mrs. J. D. Walker, Toronto, who addressed the annual meeting of the London Presbyterian last past winter, will be present as Ontario president. The western division has a membership of 88,360, an increase of 8,068 members and 15 new auxiliaries or organized units last year. The senior auxiliaries number 1,515, young women's auxiliaries 193, mission bands 1,002, and associate societies 160.

According to the general treasurer's statement, the total contributions for last year sent in by provincial societies amounted to \$332,886.83.
