item: "Sir Henry Thornton, president of the National Railways, has declined to sign the papers for the purchase of the Hydro-Electric Commission, on behalf of Toronto, of the Toronto Suburban Railway, which operates from this city to Woodbridge and Guelph, until at least he has had a chance to look into the whole matter personally, and decided whether the radial is necessary as part of the national system.

"This information was secured to day by the Star from Sir Henry Thornton in Ottawa when he was asked what was meant by a state-ment of Mayor Maguire of Toronto that his worship was waiting for a telegram before giving orders to tear up Toronto Suburban tracks on Da-

venport road."
Regarding the announced plan of the Canadian National to electrify the Grand Trunk between Toronto and the Niagara district, Sir Henry Thornton made a statement in Ot-tawa today, which, according to the Toronto Star, was in part as follows:
"The announcement on behalf of
the Canadian National Railways was only made after mature considera-tion and consultation with those re-sponsible for the administration of the system. It is well within the ability of the Canadian National Rail-ways to accomplish what is set out

what it said. "The hydro radial advocates propose to construct and operate independent railway between Co-bourg, Toronto, Hamilton, St. Catharines and other points in the vicin-This railway is to be of standard gauge and of sufficient capacity to handle standard passenger and freight car equipment. It would closely parallel the lines of the Cana-dian National Railways in that territory. It would connect at the Ni-agara frontier with various United States railways and would inter-

TIME FOLLOW LEAD OF ELDERS

Will Protect People of Canada Pass Bill For Boosting Canadian Standard Efficiency Work in Province.

> Toronto, Dec. 29.-National issues emerged along with the problems of youth in the business that came today before the second day's session of the Ontario Boys' Parliament, which is being held in the Ontario legislative chamber. Upon such important questions as those of the utility of the party system in politics and of progress by constitutional means the embryo statesmen were required to take their stand. In both matters they rendered verdicts' which recorded them as following the traditions of their elders, the first deision being in the form of a vote which approved party politics and the second being in the form of a summary ejection which the ser-geant-at-arms was ordered to give a bolshevik who had intruded into the chamber.

Seemed in Peril.

The party system in politics for a lew moments seemed to be in great peril. One member, with all the en-thusiasm of youth, subjected it to a vigorous attack. "The party system," he said, "has fallen into disuse. throughout the country. It is being replaced by the group system. The party system does not allow a member to vote according to his con-science. He is bound by the rules of his party and frequently must vote for a bill with which he is not in

accord. Against this arrangement., however, the much-criticized party system found defenders which turned the tide of opinion in its favor. made possible, it was pointed out, the presentation of arguments pro and con on any issue. Finally—and this was the point which eventually swayed the youthful legislators to-ward it—"the senior parliaments have not been able to improve on it, so how can we expect to do so?"

On Practical Basis.

These incidents were the feature ones of a day's arduous legislating by the "members." They attacked with all the vigor which parliamentary procedure permits a program of legislation calculated to enhance the oys' work movement and to replace the junior parliament itself on a practical basis. Their proceedings were strictly in accord with the best
