MONEY IS STOLEN FROM TROUSERS OF HOUSE OWNER

Thief Enters Home of C. H. Hessey by Door and Secures \$11.

TWO ATTEMPTS Evidence Revealed of Attacks on Other Residents in City.

Sneak thieves were again rampant last night, one house being entered and robbed, while attempts were made to enter two others.

Some time during the night the home of C. H. Hessey, 444 Hill street, was broken into and searched. The robber found nothing until he arrived at the bedroom where Mr. and Mrs. Hessey were sleeping. Going through Mr. Hessey's trousers he found \$11 which he purloined and then evidently left without making a further search. Both doors of the house were closed, neither of them having been locked.

Adam Rolfe, 55 Hunt street, was also paid a visit by the prowler about 1:35 a.m. The thief, who made small noise in the house he wakened Miss Rolfe, who alarmed the remainder of the household, with the result that the man made his escape without being seen. Entrance in this case was made through removing a screen of the bedroom window, which was easily done.

George Askey, 60 Front street, was the third place visited but here the man did not enter, although several of the windows were tried. Signs that he had tried to force an entrance were found by Mr. Askey.

Detectives are of the opinion that it is the same man who committed the depredations of Saturday and Sunday nights, and again urge on residents the necessity of seeing that lower floor doors and windows are securely fastened before retiring.

MRS. MARY A. TOLL. The funeral of Mrs. Mary A. Toll, widow of the late Peter Toll whose death occurred on Saturday last, was held Tuesday afternoon from the family residence, 632 Elizabeth street. The services were conducted by the Rev. Quinton Warner of Cronyn Memorial Church assisted by the Rev. W. Parson. Interment took place in Woodland Cemetery.

MEMBERS AMAZED WITH THE BETTING AT EPSOM DOWNS

Might as Well Try To Stop Niagara as Wagering on Horses.

NOVEL EXPERIENCE Whole Pleasure of Racing Lies in Betting, Says Visiting Parliamentarian.

London, June 7.—The members of the House of Commons' committee which is investigating the question of taxing betting, attended the Derby at Epsom Downs yesterday as guests of the Jockey Club. Several of the committee members, habitual frequenters of the race track, acted as guides for their colleagues who until yesterday had never seen the horses run. Those M.P.s came away with their innocence unimpaired but were much interested in their novel experience.

Their main impression, as recorded in interviews, concerned the universality of betting on the course and the insignificant part the actual racing played in the pleasure of the enormous crowd, only a small fraction of which was able to see the running of the Derby. Even on the grandstand, one committee member said, it was only possible to see the horses for a space of about 30 seconds. Isaac Foot, one of the novices, said he and his fellow innocents were amazed at the extent of the betting business and staggered by the amount of money which changed hands. They came to the conclusion, he added, that an attempt to prevent betting would be like a mud-fence as trying to turn back Niagara Falls.

Less Injurious. David Grenfell, a miner-M.P. from South Wales, "found more to amuse than to admire." He said he never understood what people meant when they said racing could not be done without betting, but he now realized that after watching a few races one would find it monotonous and boring. He believed that race-course betting was likely to be less injurious to the community than Sir Beddoe Rees, Liberal, was assembling at a gaily table.

MURDEROUS COUPLE SENTENCED TO DEATH

Crowd Cheers When Penalty Is Imposed On Man and Wife Who Killed 33.

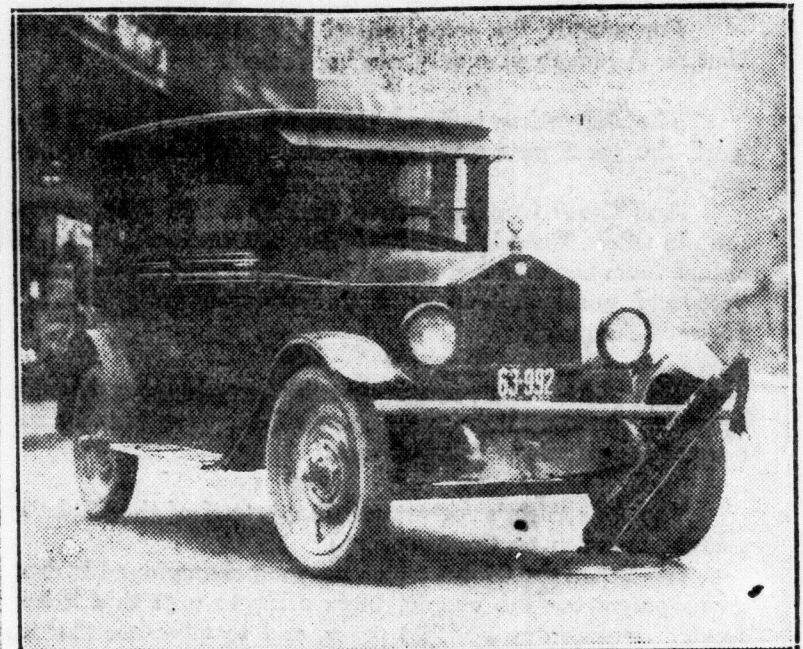
Associated Press Despatch. Moscow, June 7.—Vasil Komaroff, convicted of the murder of 33 persons, and his wife, as his accomplice, were sentenced today to be shot within 72 hours. Neither betrayed any emotion as the sentence was pronounced, but there was loud applause from the crowd in the courtroom and cries that the sentence should be carried into effect immediately instead of waiting 72 hours.

REJECT POLICE SYSTEM BECAUSE OF HIGH COST

New County Committee Is Expected Will Bring In Report Tonight.

Although the new county police committee of the Middlesex County council did not meet this morning, it was expected that the committee would plan a new system of police protection for the 40,000 residents of the rural district surrounding London, it is expected a meeting will be held today, as the committee has been instructed to bring in a report at the night session of the council.

As the now defunct committee, which was appointed at the special April session, had its proposal to hire a high constable at a salary of \$2,000 a year and furnish him with a powerful car, rejected, the new committee expects to find it hard to work out a system which will give adequate protection and at the same time conform with the policy of economy adopted by the 1923 council.

MISS BECK WINS OVER MISS BAKER IN GOLF PLAYOFF

Londoners Have Great Struggle Which Terminates at Seventeenth.

GOES INTO FINALS Miss A. Farncomb and Miss Margaret Findlay Win in Consolation.

Canadian Press Despatch. Brantford Golf Club, June 7.—Early indications were fulfilled when the weather cleared off and allowed the semi-finalists in the seven flights other than the championship to start off the second last day's play in the Ontario ladies' golf championship tournament.

The first pair to finish were Miss Dorothy Thompson of Paris and Mrs. E. A. MacKenzie of Woodstock, the former qualifying for the final of the championship consolation by a 4 and 3 victory. Miss Thompson was held even for the first four holes, but struck stride and was four up at the turn and kept her lead until the fifteenth. Mrs. MacKenzie only won two holes, eight being halved.

Miss Marion Beck and Miss Helen Baker, both of London, had a great struggle, which terminated at the 17th. Miss Beck winning 2 and 1. Miss Beck was defeated in the final of this event last year.

Both played good golf and made the turn on even terms, Miss Baker obtained the lead soon afterwards but encountered trouble on the last four holes and was not very strong on her approaches.

FAVORS SPECIAL INSTRUCTION FOR TRUANT YOUTHS

Dr. Weir Urges Older Boys Be Given Separate Room.

LEAVE SCHOOLS Fail To Return To Their Studies Upon Losing Employment.

What London needs in the handling of its truant school children problem, according to Dr. Weir, the truant officer, is special school classes for the boys who have left school to go to work, and then for some reason leave their employment.

"What often happens in London is this," said the doctor today to The Advertiser. "A boy leaves school, and gets a special permit to allow him to go to work. Then for some reason or another he leaves, and the first thing we know about it is that his boy's leaving to us within two days, yet very few of them do it, and the boys drift away, and get into bad company. If we could get hold of them directly they leave, it would be much better for them and for the city."

"In Sarnia, for instance," he continued, "they have adopted a system of special classes for these boys. The classes are arranged for these boys alone, so that they feel no shyness or discomfort in going back to school, which is always the case when a big boy has to return to the class with much smaller and younger boys who are just as far ahead as he is in the work."

Classes Practical. "The classes are made practical and interesting; there is none of the stiffness that accompanies so much of the formal curriculum. Down in Sarnia the boys who have been sent to these classes like them so well that they often go back to them of their own free will as soon as they get home. They are rather a combination of technical school courses, and the more interesting and practical side of education."

Dr. Weir thinks that if something of this kind were instituted in London, the problem of looking after the truant boy, and in particular the boy who has been given a permit to work and then left his employment, would be greatly simplified.
