SCHOOL BOARD TO SIFT COMPENSATION CLAIMS

Made by Parents of Children
Hurt At Public
Schools.

TWO CASES APPEAR

**Girl Died From Shock When
School Ceiling Fell 16
Years Ago.**

Two cases before No. 2 committee of the board of education yesterday, in which parents of children who have been injured in accidents in the London public schools, and in which compensation is either asked or claimed, will be investigated by a special committee in the next few days.

The cases concern Vera Keyes, the daughter of William R. Keyes of 40 Beaconsfield avenue, who was a pupil attending the St. George's school in 1908, when the ceiling of one of the classrooms fell in. She was injured at the time, suffering a form of shell shock, and after 16 years of illness died at the end of March, Mr. Keyes, who does not demand compensation from the board, says he has paid out over \$3,000 in medical attention for his daughter.

The second case had to do with the daughter of A. F. Kelly, of 69 Smith street, who fell while playing on the grounds of Trafalgar School, cutting her knee on a can. The claim upon the board in this case is for \$50.

The naming of the new London West school is another matter of consideration before the board, and this will also be attended to, and a recommendation brought to the board by the school inspector at the next meeting. Empress School is the name that seems to be finding most favor with the trustees so far, in view of the fact that the school stands on Empress avenue and that the old school has always been known as the Empress Avenue School.

The contract for the supply of window blinds to two schools was let to Smallman & Ingram, who were the lowest tenderers. The Dakin street baseball grounds, which are the property of the board, will be let to W. C. Rumble for the use of certain baseball clubs in London South. The committee, however, made it plain that all responsibility as to liability for accidents taking place on this ground will have to be borne by Mr. Rumble.

The new Trafalgar School will be taken over by the board officially in about two weeks' time, Architect Carrothers stated. Mrs. Hunt told the members she had visited the school, and that it would need some housecleaning before the official opening, which Capt. Robinson promised to have done. Architect Carrothers, in response to a request from the Mother's Club of this school, made them a present of a new flag, so that when Empire Day comes along the school will not be behind the others in its decorations. The committee thanked Mr. Carrothers for his kindness.

When the board let the contract for the painting of the board rooms to the painters, Westland Bros., it stated only the walls and ceilings, saying nothing of the radiators. Now when the painting is almost done the painters say they will only paint the radiators at a charge of \$1.50 a radiator. Accordingly, the board asked them to paint the walls behind the radiators "as per contract." The painters came back yesterday with compliance with this request, provided the board removed the radiators. After some discussion on the benefits of painting with a spraying machine the committee came to the conclusion that to remove the radiators was too expensive a stunt, and also that radiators are not properly washed, and that the contractors could not be forced to include them in the painting contract.

Eighty-four chairs and desks at a cost of about \$9.50 for the two are to be bought for Simcoe and Hecory schools, and tenders will be asked for by the board at once.

**ENTIRE FAMILY IS KILLED
WHEN TRAIN HITS AUTO**

Wilson was killed instantly. The others died shortly after being taken to a hospital.

**STREET RAILWAY
TO BE MET SOON
BY CITY COUNCIL**

**Mayor Wenige Makes An-
nouncement To No. 2 Com-
mittee Meeting.**

CURRIE TO BE PRESENT

Mayor Wenige announced at a meeting of No. 2 committee of the city council yesterday afternoon that the city would meet representatives of the street railway in a few days, possibly Saturday, at which there would be some "give and take" regarding a number of matters, including paying track allowances. Chairman Greer attempted to lead the mayor into a statement as to just what might be expected at the gathering, but the mayor would not give out any important details ahead of time.

"President Currie will be here," stated the Mayor. "I have been in touch with him. There will be concessions on both sides, but no changes in the bylaw."

The famous iron castings tender again came up for consideration, and after considerable discussion, the committee decided to recommend to the council that the tender be let to the lowest bidder, the Canada Iron Foundry, St. Thomas.

Hamilton Bingle of George White & Company addressed the council on the subject of castings, pointing out the difficulty of finding work for the molders during slack seasons. He thought the tender should go to a local firm even if the price were a little higher.

Chairman Greer and Ald. Hayden thought the same thing, but Ald. Towse, Mayor Wenige, Ald. Bottrill and Ald. Shaw voted for the lowest tender, thereby saving the city \$500.

Ald. Greer pointed out that a number of molders had left the city owing to the fact that they could not obtain employment.

Ald. Towse then read a letter from a taxpayer who works in St. Thomas as a molder, but hustles back and forth each day on the L. & P. S. He declared there were four other men doing the same thing.

A deputation was present to argue about the Wellington street south boulevard, but remained to pray, everything being to their satisfaction. Plan No. 4, as approved at a recent ratemakers' meeting, was adopted by the committee.

Paving plans for the year which naturally are linked up with street railway affairs were given more or less a hoist until after the gathering announced by the mayor. Work will, however, be started on the Bridges street pavement immediately. The mayor and Ald. Hayden and Shaw voted for it, while Ald. Greer, Bottrill and Towse were opposed. This left the matter in the air, but when the mayor explained it would mean hardship to a large number of laborers who needed the work, if the matter was delayed, Ald. Bottrill changed his mind.

The street railway atmosphere that has been in vogue at all recent meetings was introduced by Mayor Wenige, who stated the company was willing to pave the track allowance. "Will they meet us?" asked Ald. Greer.

The mayor answered in the affirmative, declaring the company was pleased with the boulevard plan because it would save them money.

**UNEMPLOYED BENEFITS
PAYMENTS EXTENDED**
Unemployment Insurance Bill
Receives Royal
Assent.

London, April 15.—The unemployment insurance bill, which already had been passed by the House of Commons, was read a third time in the House of Lords today and received the royal assent.

The unemployment insurance bill extends the period for which unemployed benefits may be paid this year at an estimated additional cost of between £2,000,000 and £2,250,000 to be met out of the unemployment fund.
