EXPLOSION OF STILL IS FATAL TO OWNER

Rochester Butcher Killed and Shop Wrecked—Entire Vicinity Threatened.

Rochester, N.Y., Nov. 15.—Anthony Coffaro, 50, a butcher, was killed, and an entire neighborhood threat-

ened with destruction by fire today, when a still in the rear of his store exploded.

Coffaro's wife and eight children, two of them blind, were trapped on an upper floor and were rescued only after a street car motorman had risked his life in the burning structure.

The force of the blast blew out the rear of the Coffaro store. Stores adjoining were quickly ignited and firemen battled for more than an hour before the fire was brought under control. Firemen discovered four stills in the wrecked rear room.

BRUTAL MURDER AGAIN REVEALED

Body of F. Genesee, Hamilton Taxi Driver, Found by Workman.

Hamilton, Nov. 16.—The mystery surrounding the disappearance of Fred Genesee, 136 Balmoral avenue north, taxi driver, was solved Saturday morning when workmen found his body on the mountainside, a half mile east of Stoney Creek. Genesee was murdered, and the circumstances of his death are similar to those surrounding the murder of Joe Baytolze, whose remains were found on the mountain near Albion Falls a week ago. Revenge is believed to be the motive in both cases. Genesee, it is expected, was friendly with the police. A change belt containing about \$5 was found on Genesee's body. Examination showed that he had been brutally treated. A rope was wrapped around his neck five times. There was a bullet hole through his wrist, and one eye was either gouged out or blown out by a bullet fired at close range. A towel was used to strangle him, and there was evidence of a blow being struck on the head by a blunt instrument. In the Baytolze case the head of the victim was severed from the body.

LONDONERS ARE LOSERS WHEN COTTAGES LOOTED

About Twenty Summer Homes at Grand Bend Entered by Thieves.

Grand Bend, Nov. 16.—About 20 cottages on the London side of the summer resort here have been entered and, hundreds of dollars' worth of clothing, bedding and foodstuffs stolen. Discovery of the robbery was made by a Londoner who came to his cottage for the week-end, and investigation showed that the thieves had been general.

Country Constable W. B. Oliver, assisted by Provincial Officer Albert Whitesides of Hensall, is at work on the case, and some important clues have been unearthed. Last fall some of the cottages were entered and considerable property removed, but not to the wholesale extent of this year. At that time Constable Oliver had little in the way of clues, but by persistent effort he finally secured necessary evidence to secure conviction of the thieves. Londoners have great faith in his ability to clear up the present case, and some arrests are expected shortly.

LEADERS WILL SPEAK IN W. HASTINGS FIGHT

Hon. Arthur To Speak For Porter—Premier To Appear.

Ottawa, Nov. 15.—Right Hon. Arthur Meighen returned to the city this morning from the west.

The opposition leader expects to address the constituents of West Hastings, on behalf of the Conservative, E. Guas Porter, on the 18th, 19th, 20th and 24th instants.

The date fixed for the visit of Premier Mackenzie King to this riding is November 24, the day before the elections mark their ballots.

G. PASHA WITHDRAWS RESIGNATION AT CAIRO

Demonstrative Crowds Cheer Minister—Destroy Opposition Plant.

Cairo, Egypt, Nov. 16.—Gaglou Pasha today withdrew his resignation as premier, which was presented in the chamber of deputies Saturday.

Students left their books yesterday and joined with thousands of other persons who came to work to parade the streets, cheering Gaglou. Numerous political speeches were made, urging the party leaders to proceed to the palace and beg the king not to accept the premier's resignation.

One crowd of demonstrators attacked the premises of Al Kashkoul, a comic illustrated weekly, which has consistently caricatured Gaglou and his colleagues, and wrecked the plant and set fire to the paper supplies in the building.

STOLEN CAR BRINGS DEATH TO TWO ROCHESTER MEN

Rochester, N. Y., Nov. 15.—Two men, Eugene Schnable, 26, and Otto Ettina, 22, both of this city, were killed today when a stolen automobile in which they were riding was struck by an express train at Gates Crossing.

KITCHENER CITY HALL IS OFFICIALLY OPENED

Kitchener, Nov. 16.—Kitchener's new city hall, costing \$350,000, was formally opened Saturday afternoon by His Honor Lieutenant-Governor Harry Cockshutt, in the presence of a large gathering.

Congratulations were extended to the city by the lieutenant-governor and Mayor Hiltz of Toronto, both of whom declared that the building was another indication of the progressive spirit of the citizens.

In the evening the Kitchener city band provided a community dance near the new city hall, in which many persons participated until a late hour.

TRUCK DRIVER KILLED.

Kaiser Threatened Suicide When Chancellor Resigned

Former German Ruler in Pathetic Note, Threatens To End Life.

APPEALS FOR FAMILY

Berlin, Nov. 16.—A story of how former Emperor William threatened to commit suicide is revealed in a book written by Theodore Wolff, editor of the Tageblatt, dealing with Germany's policy during the chancellorship of Von Buelow.

Emperor William had in 1909 signed a treaty of alliance which pledged Germany to aid Russia in Europe, but not in Asia. Von Buelow, low disapproved of the treaty, and thereupon William wrote Von Buelow a pathetic letter, in which he said the chancellor's resignation gave him such a shock that he had collapsed, and he feared he would have a serious nervous illness.

In the letter the kaiser reminded Von Buelow that to please him he had ridden in a strange horse, notwithstanding his crippled left arm, and the horse had nearly killed him.

He rode among the Spanish anarchists, said the letter, "because you wanted me to and because your policy would benefit by it; and now after I have done all this you wish to leave me. If you now disavow your policy I should be made to look ridiculous, which I cannot survive." Then comes a postscript saying: "The morning after the receipt of your resignation you will not find your kaiser alive. Think of my poor wife and children."

Von Buelow, according to Wolff, finally withdrew his resignation, and his reward, the writer declares, came three years later, when the kaiser dismissed him with the remark, "I have chased the scoundrel away."

BELLEVILLE OPERATOR DIES.

Belleville, Nov. 16.—William G. Pearce, a telegraph operator, whose home is in Hamilton, died in the hospital here today, the victim of a stroke. He was 66 years of age.

FARMER INJURED BY ANGRY STEER

Has Skull Badly Fractured by Animal Near Ridgetown.

St. Thomas, Nov. 16.—An elderly man named Tintin, farming near Ridgetown, is in the Amasa Wood hospital in a critical condition as a result of being attacked Saturday afternoon by an angry steer.

Tintin and others had herded a herd of cattle in the yards at Ridgetown. One of the animals broke from the herd and raced down the track. Mr. Tintin ran in front of the frightened animal. Instead of stopping, the frightened beast charged the man, striking him full on the chest, so that he fell on his back, his head coming in contact with one of the rails.

The skull is fractured so seriously that his recovery is doubtful.

Three Hundred Die In Quake

Batavia, Java, Nov. 15.—The death toll in the earthquake which shook the central portion of the island of Java last Wednesday is estimated in official circles at 300, although private reports indicate that as many as 600 persons may have perished.

Six villages are completely isolated by floods. The damage to private property at Wonosobo exceeds \$120,000.

MRS. W. G. HARDING SPENDS COMFORTABLE NIGHT

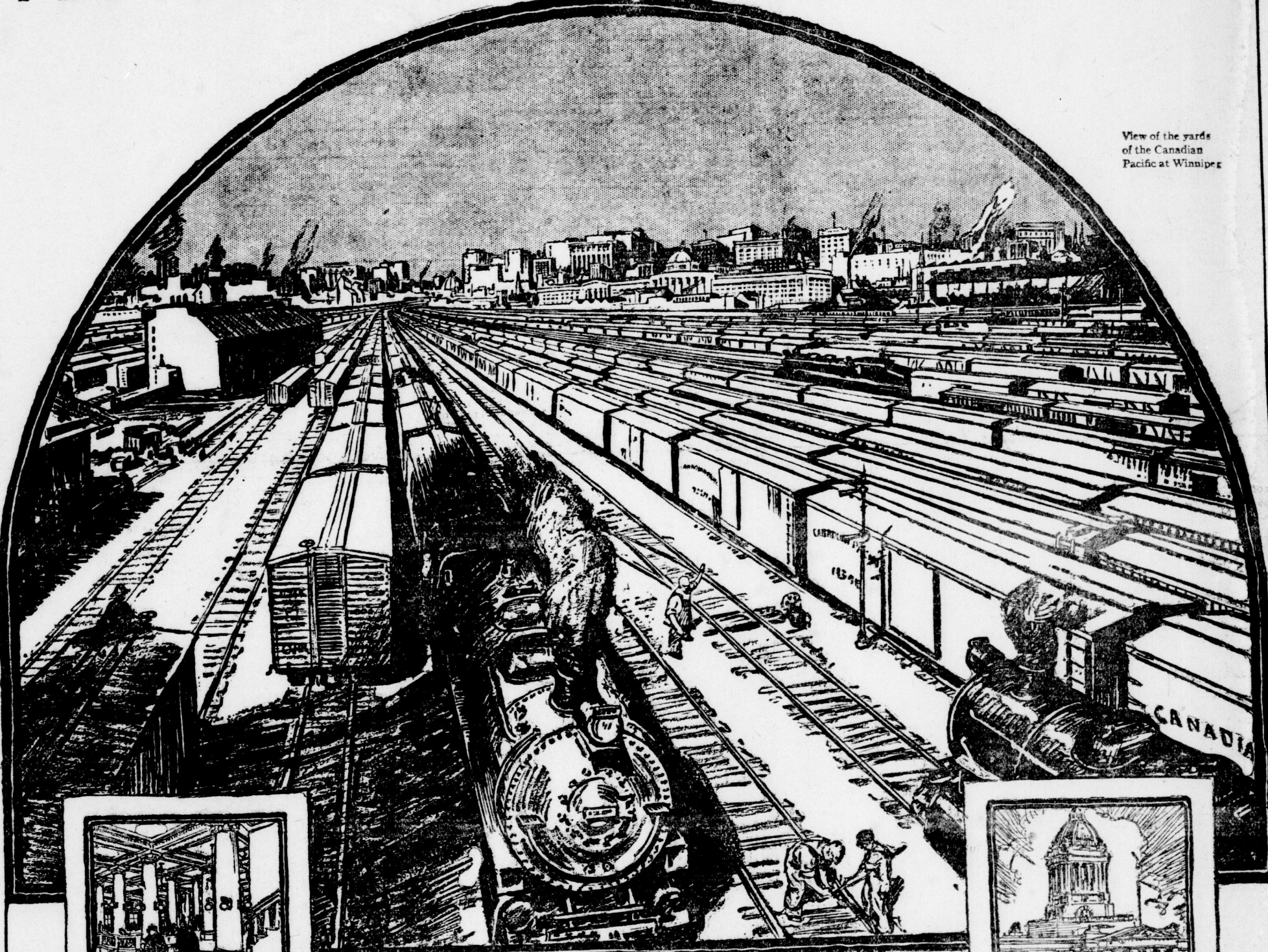

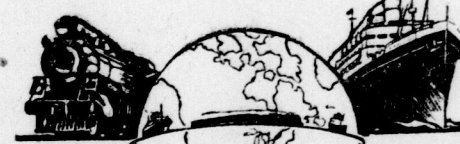
